

Jomarie Kurutowicz's seventh-inning single drove in the winning run and allowed Patricia Boyle Chevrolet to split a softball double-header with Lake Orion-Oxford last Thursday.

Boyle Chevrolet won the first game 4-3 after Skurtowicz, from Livonia Ladywood, knocked in Kelly Coulson with the game-winner in the Waterford and Lake Orion game.

After Lake Orion-Oxford, which won the second game 6-3, scored twice in the top of the seventh to tie, Coulson drew a walk to start the winning rally in the bottom of the inning. She stole second and took third on a wild pitch.

Coulson also had an RBI single earlier in the game, and Lisa Rockefeller was the hero with a two-run single that gave Boyle Chevrolet a 3-1 lead in the second inning.

Shannon White, also from Ladywood, went the distance on the mound in both games. In the time-shortened, five-inning first game, she tossed a five-bitter and walked six.

White also managed 10 hits in the nightcap. Kelli Koss, graduate of Farmington High who now plays for Oakland Community College, was 3-for-4 and scored three runs for LOO.

Jenny Kennedy, Ladywood Blazer, was 2-for-3 and had one RBI for Boyle Chevrolet. Coulson knocked in a run with a triple, and Anne Rattewicz added an RBI single.

Boyle Chevrolet, captained by Al White and Dave Brubaker, is 9-5 and plays another double-header tonight at Fenlon High School.

Following a busy off-season in the front office, the Redford NACE (North American Computer Equipment) Junior A hockey team has turned its attention to the ice.

The team, formerly known as the Redford Royals, will conduct a mini-camp for veterans, free agents and draft choices July 22-23 at the Plymouth Ice Arena.

The team has invited 112 players to the camp, including 33 veterans from its Junior A and Junior B (known as the Wayne Chiefs) teams, eight free agents and 72 players whose rights were acquired in last month's draft. Walk-on players are not invited to this camp.

Players will be divided into four teams for the two-day workouts that will enable the coaching staff to evaluate talent before the start of training camp on Friday, Aug. 1.

"What we want to do is determine where our strengths and weaknesses are, position by position," coach Kyle Krug said. "This way, when we go into camp next month and begin formulating depth charts, we will have a better understanding of where we're at and where we need to go."

THE REDFORD NACE consists of 17- to 19-year-old players and will compete in the West Division of the North American Junior Hockey League. The acquisition of the franchise by NACE owners Larry and Marilyn Johnson and subsequent name change are part of a radical front office overhaul.

Redford Cifelli, president of MCW Computer Services, is the new general manager. His assistant is Eddie Mio, former NHL goalie with the Detroit Red Wings and New York Rangers.

Krug, the new head coach, comes to Redford from the Compuware hockey program, where he coached Junior A and Midget teams for the past four years. Dave Rostek, formerly head coach at the University of Michigan-Dearborn, and Tim Zimmerman, currently the head coach at the St. Josephine South High School, have been appointed as Krug's assistants.

Strong pitching and a productive offense have meant a four-game winning streak for the North Farmington/West Bloomfield Connie Mack baseball team.

NFWB lost five straight games earlier this month, but Monday it was applying the finishing touch to its losing streak, topping Huron Valley 8-6 at Millford High School.

NFWB coach Rich Rachtner hasn't made many visits to the mound during the four-game winning streak, as evidenced by four straight complete-game performances from his pitching staff.

"We'd been struggling," Rachtner said. "It's just that the boys came up with good games. We had been falling apart defensively, and some of our pitchers had trouble with walks."

"Pitching is extremely important. If your pitcher can't control the ball around the plate and do away free passes, you have a chance to win every game."

NFWB began the streak Saturday, sweeping at Brockton from Plymouth Salem, 8-2 and 6-1, at Orchard Lake St. Mary's College.

T.J. Orman scattered five hits, walked none and struck out five men in the first inning, and Seltz and both Seltz and Orman were unscathed. A pair of doubles by Herberholz led NFWB at the plate, and Kutcher also contributed a double.

WHITE was the hero both at the plate and as a pitcher in the nightcap, won by NFWB 8-1. Making his pitching debut, White, who normally plays catcher, went a distance and allowed six hits, walked four and fanned four.

"The attitude on this team was excellent," he said. "Everyone knows he can play softball. What it boils down to is we played the better defense in this tournament."

"In this type of tournament, if you give a team an extra out, they can come back and score a ton of runs."


