Simulated space trip thrills Hills youngster

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support systems for survival in space.

The program "beamed up" beginning with Launch Day's tour of the USA Rocket Garden, which contains all types of rockets that have been launched from Kennedy Space Center and Cape Canaveral Air Force Station in the past 30 years.

Microgravity Day marked Maura's favorite adventure, with exercises on the microgravity machine, putting students in the role of astronauts preparing for space walks and the lack of gravity in space.

The program ended on Mission Day, which focuses on each team's simulated flight at the Florida Training Center. Teams prepare a mission based on their training throughout the week and conduct a simulated flight from countdown to orbit and landing.

Maura's team placed second and she placed first with her individual rocket launch project.

MAURA ALSO worked in chemical experiments and model rocket assembly. "I worked on an experiment, but it exploded," she said. "I guess I put in too much of one chemical."

Maura graduated from the U.S. Space Camp on June 9 and received her Space Camp wings and a diploma. Each student also received a videotape of their team's space mission throughout the week.

"There is an advanced space program in Georgia," Maura said. "I want to go there next year."

Maura lives on Chesapeake with her father, Bill, mother, Molly, brothers, Brian, 15, and Patrick, 9, and sister, Kerry, 10.

She plays on the basketball, soccer, and softball teams at school.

Space Camp costs \$520, which includes housing and registration fees. The cost does not include airfare.

Man, son face charges in beating of officers

A West Bloomfield man and his son, captured with beating two Middletown, Ohio, police officers, were returned to jail after a Wednesday court hearing.

Judge James Combs of Middletown Municipal Court set a \$100,000 bond for Bruce H. Ferguson, 42, who faces two counts of felonious assault and one count each of aggravated burglary and grand theft in the beatings of police officers David Brinkman, 21, and Scott Reeve, 23.

A preliminary hearing was set for Friday before the judge, who was to appoint a lawyer for Ferguson.

Ferguson's 17-year-old son, Bruce Ferguson Jr., was arraigned in Butler County Juvenile Court Thursday on charges of felonious assault, grand theft of one police officer's service revolver and aggravated burglary, said Fred Saurber, the court's chief probation officer.

Bruce Ferguson Jr. was confined without bond in the court's detention unit. He awaits a preliminary hearing Aug. 3 before Judge David J. Nicholas, who could decide to refer the case to the adult courts. Saurber said prosecutors had not made that request Wednesday.

POLICE IN Farmington Hills said Wednesday they also want Bruce Ferguson Sr. on pending felony charges. Ferguson is charged with carrying a concealed weapon and with first-degree retail fraud for allegedly trying to steal \$300 in merchandise from a Farmington store, police Detective Darnel Krause said. He also has a prior record in West Bloomfield.

Police said the Fergusons were arrested Monday along I-75 in Erlanger, Ky. two hours after the beatings in Ohio.

Smith said Reeve spotted a suspicious vehicle parked behind a Middletown K mart store Monday night, investigated and uncovered a burglary in progress. Brinkman was dispatched to help him.

The Fergusons were jailed before the father and son waived extradition and were brought late Tuesday to Butler County.

Reeve and Brinkman were treated at Middletown Regional Hospital for head injuries after they were struck with a blunt object, Middletown Police Chief Earl Smith said. The officers haven't returned to duty, a police spokeswoman said Wednesday.
