It is vital to the safety of your family to know where to go in an emergency. This chart shows the approximate distance from various intersections to selected Oakland County hospital emergency rooms. Use this chart, locate, on the left column, the nearest major intersection to your home, school or work location. Then read across for distances to various hospitals.

When to use a hospital emergency room.

Hospital emergency rooms are staffed and equipped to treat patients with medical conditions that can cause death or permanent impairment of health if treatment is delayed. Hospital emergency rooms are generally equipped to handle heart attacks, strokes, head injuries, poisoning, burns and most other serious problems. Surgical facilities, diagnostic and X-ray equipment, trauma rooms, cardiac units and overnight-care facilities are found in a hospital emergency room.

Caution:
If in doubt, it's best to go to the nearest hospital emergency room.

Caution:
Know beforehand the difference between a hospital emergency room and an urgent care center. Even when these centers are associated by name with hospitals, they cannot provide the support required in serious emergencies.

Hospital emergency rooms in your area, as of publication date, are shown on the map.

When to use something else.
See your personal physician or go to an urgent care center for conditions which require quick action but are not likely to cause death or irreparable harm if not treated immediately. If in doubt, go to an emergency room. If you do not have a physician, call 360-3450 weekdays, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. for a hospital referral to an appropriate physician or specialist. There is no charge for this service.

If Huron Valley Hospital is near your home or office, preregister your family now.

Now you can prepare for an emergency by providing us with the important patient information needed by our emergency room staff. You can also provide for medical treatment of minor children by filling out a Medical Care Authorization Form now. Personal emergency room identification cards will be issued to your family members. Full details are available from Huron Valley Hospital.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS CITY COUNCIL PETITIONS

Petitions are available at the Office of the City Clerk, 31555 Eleven Mile Road. If you plan to seek one of four seats opening for Council Member of the Farmington Hills City Council or to fill one vacant seat for a term ending November 1991.

Petitions may be requested from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. All candidates who qualify will be placed on the ballot. The deadline for filing petitions is 4:00 p.m., August 22, 1989.

There is no Primary Election. Voters will elect four Councilpersons for regular terms and one Councilperson to fill an unexpired vacancy on a Non-Partisan Ballot at the regular odd-year General City Election Tuesday, November 7, 1989.

Candidates for nomination must meet the following qualifications:

- Must be a duly registered elector of the City of Farmington Hills.
- Must submit petitions signed by at least 93 and not more than 186 qualified registered electors by 4:00 p.m. on August 22, 1989.
- Must submit two Affidavits of Identity of Candidates Filing Nominating Petitions (available at the City Clerk's Office).
- Must submit an affidavit as to name change (if applicable).

Current Council Members whose terms are expiring are Philip Arnold, Ben Marks, Joann Soronen, Aldo Vagnozzi; and on the unexpired vacancy, Paul Sovereby.
