# Area legislators listen up on rail safety

The Freeland rescue operation was just great. But residents near the CSX railroad in that Saginaw County village told state legislators Monday to make sure tank cars carrying hazardous chemicals don't derail in the first place.

"Once an accident has happened, the system has failted — regardless of how good the evacuation is," George Blackhurst of nearby Midnight of the Mouse panel chaired by Rep. James Kosteva, D-Canton.

"To them, if a crash) is just one of the costs of doing business," said Wayne Ziegler, a Freeland resident who attacked mid in the first of the costs of doing.

man for Citizens Against Toxic Trains (CATT), a group formed after an April 25 derailment in Oakland County's Highland Township. "Think in terms of a Saginaw, a Detroit, a Grand Rapids," he said.

A STANDING room only crowd jammed the Tittabawassec Township Hall for more than three hours to emphasize preventing the kinds of accidents that occurred July 22 when 40 were injured and 3,000 evacuated for several days.

Fourteen carra of a CSX train went off the track at 11:25 that morning, including three carrying Dow Corning hazardous chemicals.

Kosteva, whose western Wayne County district is criss-crossed by Tailroads, said lawrankers first want to assure "the quickest and best possible response" — labeling of tank cars, proper records of what trains

To Rep. Mat Dunnskiss, R-Lake Orion, the mystery was why the rail cars broke open and burned. "The cars are built to withstand crashes," said the northern Oakland lawmaker. "That should be the focus of legislation."

Dolan asked about the crash's effect on wildlife and was told by a Department of Natural Resources official that no deaths of birds or deer were attributed to the crash. Most residents near the crash site have city water, although DNR asked there might be some danger to hose with shallow wells.
