

Inter-Lake Sells One Division

Inter-Lake Window Industries, Inc., of Novi, Robert E. Metz said that the company's total inventory, storm windows distributed to some 150 dealers in three states, has announced the sale of its storm window manufacturing facilities. Windows and Doors, Inc., a

Detroit-based manufacturer. Price was not disclosed. Inter-Lake's sister company, Enamalum Corp., and its commercial replacement window division were retained by the parent firm, which will be named Inter-Lake Industries, Inc.

Metz said the decision to sell Inter-Lake's home improvement division was predicated on the company's increased involvement in the nationwide marketing of its replacement windows for commercial buildings. Both Inter-Lake and Enamalum, a company specializing in painting aluminum extrusions, are housed at 25450 Novi Road.

WCCC Redford Branch Closed

The Redford Township branch of Wayne County Community College closed its doors this week. The reason cited by college officials was "insufficient enrollment to make the branch economical. Approximately 110 students were affected by the closing, but they can enroll in nearby branches, according to William Colovas, instructional coordinator at the college.

The Redford branch, based in Marshall Junior High, is refunding the tuition paid by local students who signed up at the branch. Colovas said the other branches will be open for registration through Thursday, Jan. 14.

The nearest branches are at Riverdale High School, Dearborn Heights; Cody High School, Detroit; Henry Ford High School, Detroit; and John Glenn High School, Westland.

Cody, Ford and Glenn all have complete course offerings, according to Colovas, unlike the Redford branch, which had only four course offerings when it closed.

THE ENROLLMENT at the Marshall Junior High branch has been about 125 students since it was first opened two years ago. When the branch opened this fall, it registered 112 students, down from 130 students the year before.

The enrollment figures became critical when a millage proposal to support the institution in Wayne County was defeated this fall. Classes at WCCC are self-sufficient financially with 20 or more students, according to Colovas, and with the defeat of the millage, an attempt was made to make all the classes pay for themselves.

The center was about 15 students short of the minimum necessary enrollment at the close of the school term last month, when the deadline was extended to Wednesday of last week.

However, when the deadline came and went, there still weren't enough students.

Detroit, County Air Cash Fight

Members of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners will meet with the Detroit Common Council Jan. 22 to discuss a six-year dispute over financial liabilities at the Receiving Branch of Detroit General Hospital.

At issue is whether the city or county should pay all or part of the costs for care of indigent patients.

Currently, Detroit operates the Receiving Branch at an annual loss estimated at \$8 million. Although the county reimburses Detroit some \$3 million per year for treatment of out-county patients, city officials claim the county is obligated by state law to assume the entire expense.

The difference, in the opinion of some city officials, has amounted to nearly \$25 million over the past six years.

BOTH THE city and the county face possible budget deficits during the 1971-72 fiscal year. The county anticipates a possible \$10 million deficit, and Detroit, expecting a possible \$50 million shortage of revenue, has threatened to sue the county over the hospital dispute.

The special meeting, proposed by Paul Silver, of Detroit, D-District 11, during the commissioners' board meeting Jan. 7, will be held concurrently with a Detroit Common Council meeting.

C'ville Extends Its Lunch Hour

Acting on a recommendation from Principal Ray N. Renbarger, the Clarenceville Board of Education has approved a six weeks' trial period for an extended lunch hour for all high school students beginning Feb. 1.

During the trial period, students who are assigned to the first lunch hour will eat lunch between 11:15 a.m. and 12:10 p.m. Students who are assigned to the second lunch will eat between 12:15 and 1:10 p.m.

Individual student lunch assignments will be determined and given on the students prior to the opening of

the second semester on Feb. 1.

IN ORDER to accommodate the extension of the lunch hour, 10 minutes will be added to the beginning and to the end of the school day. Starting on Feb. 1, first hour classes will begin at 8:05 a.m. and school will be dismissed at 3:10 p.m. Current bus schedules for high school students will not be changed.

Dr. Renbarger cited several educational advantages for the change to a 55-minute lunch hour.

"The primary advantage of the new program," he says, "lies in the elimination of the split fourth hour class for approximately 350 students. These students will no longer have their classes interrupted in the middle by lunch, an interruption which negatively affects the learning activities of all students who were scheduled into the split classes."

He added that the new program will also permit greater use of the library and will give students and teachers who wish to leave the building during the lunch hour a greater opportunity to do so.

The Board of Education will evaluate the result of the trial period at the Feb. 25 meeting.
