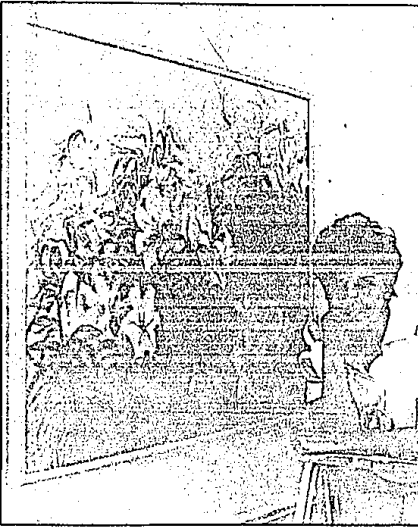


# Tomkow is Artist-on-Display



Gwen Tomkow's work can be seen now in every room of the Tom Community Center. Her watercolors will remain there throughout the month of September.

The Community Center Farmington-Farmington Hills will exhibit the works of Farmington Hills artist Gwen Tomkow through the end of September. Displayed throughout the historic, 20 room Georgian colonial home, Tomkow's collection features watercolor landscapes and still lifes.

Many of Tomkow's works depict Michigan landscapes and were painted on location at Leelanau Peninsula. She uses a staining technique where warm shades of watercolors are layered and topped with glazes of cool colors. This staining creates vibrant, rich tones full of depth and shadows.

Critics have described her works as romantic and lyrical. One critic commented that Tomkow takes a familiar subject and makes it sing through her technique.

Her numerous honors include 1988 Artist-in-Residence for Farmington and Farmington Hills and being one of 90 artists featured in the 1989 Watercolor U.S.A., a national competition staged this summer in Springfield, Mo. She also won second place in the Farmington Artists Club 1989 Spring Juried Show.

She is a member of the Farmington Artists Club, Detroit Society of Women Painters and Sculptors, and Palette and Brush.

The public may tour The Community Center, a Michigan Historic Site, free of charge and view Tomkow's exhibit. The center is open 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday. In September, the center will be open 9 a.m. to noon Saturdays. Tomkow's works on display will be available for purchase.

The Community Center Farmington-Farmington Hills is at 24705 Farmington Road, north of 10 Mile Road.
