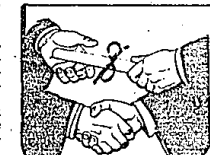
"It's a celebration of young people who have broken out of the despair of drug and alcohol addiction," said Dawn Farm board resident Grace G. Lampe.

According to Lampe, Dawn Farm is one of the last, not-for-profit treatment programs in the area to treat those who lack money or insurance, and funds raised from this event will help defray treatment costs for individuals who have no other resources.

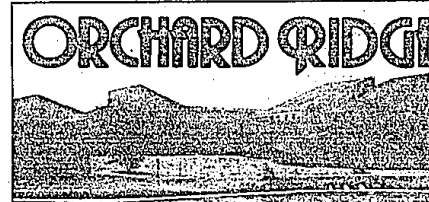
