

Nursing home fire

No one was hurt when a malfunctioning plastic fan in a basement office caught fire Wednesday morning at Oak Hill Care Center, 34225 Grand River. An employee who saw flames benesit the closed office door doused the flames with dry chemical oxtinguisher before firefighters arrived at 10:15 a.m. Firefighters variitated the basement. smoke was reported on the two residential floors; no one was evacuated. The fan, still plugged in, completely melted. It didn't appear the fire had much chance of spreading because no other combustibles were near it in the cement-block room, said officer Maria Putt of the Farmington Department of Public Safety.

Hills backs more senior tax credit

Senate Bill 348, introduced by state Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills, would reduce housing costs to zeniors and qualified renters and

Sever believes the tax burden should be reduced for seniors, but he called the bill just a tax shift. Arnold said he didn't have sufficient infor-mation to make a judgment.

Councilman Aldo Vagnozzi urged the council to support the bill con-ceptually. Legislative hearings will lower the proposed tax credit any-way, he said. "We need an increase in the property tax rebate," he said.

Victims help identify loot

Victims of break-ins in Birming-ham, Bloomfield Township, Royal Oak, Roseville and East Detroit were asked last week to identify items confiscated from a 35-year-old Southfield man arrested by Detroit police Aug. 27. Royal Oak police Lt. Don Novak said the items were centralized at his department and shown to victims on Friday and Saturday, Identifica-

tion of the Items will help police in the multi-department Investigation. Police in several suburban com-munities believe one man may have committed a rash of break-ins since


