Farmington's Jennifer Kiel set a course record Monday at Gilbert Willis Park in Walled Lake, running 19:42 on route to crushing former Walled Lake Central runner Colleen Yuba's mark.

The Falcons were denied a team victory since host Walled Lake Western had only three runners and was forced to forfeit the race.

Jennifer Ray of Western came in second with a time of 20:51, and teammate Wendy Pross finished third with 21:32. Jennifer Derwinski of Farmington finished fourth with a time of 21:27, and the Falcons' other runners included Margaret Martin (23:02), Allison Davis (23:04) and Gretchen Christopherson (23:50).

"We are doing well at this point in the season," Farmington coach John Barrett said. "Kiel had an excellent race."

Mayor Sever called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Mayor Sever, Mayor Pro-Tem Fox, Arnold, Marks, Sorenson and Vagozzi. Members absent: Sowerby. Others present: City Manager Costick, Deputy City Clerk Rose, Assistant City Manager Clark, Director of Public Services Biase and City Attorney Bibben.

The following actions were taken by City Council.

**COUNCIL:**

- Accepted resignation of John Murphy from Commission on Aging because of health reasons.

**CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)**

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order by Mayor Tupper at 8:00 p.m. on September 5, 1989, in Council Chambers, 28600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

**PRESENT:** Campbell, Hartsock, Richardson, Tupper.

**OTHERS PRESENT:** City Manager Deadman, Director Lauboff, Director Billing, City Clerk Bushey.

Minutes of the previous meeting of August 21, 1989, were approved as written. Minutes of other Boards were received and/or filed.

Council granted the following sign variances:

- A 90-day extension to Thompson-Brown Realtors for Lease signs for their buildings on Grand River;
- For the use of combustible material on permanent sign, at Tana Hill Condominiums, but denied the variance relative to a larger sign;
- To Farmington/9-Mile Associates for the use of seasonal banners at the Crossroads Shopping Center;
- To Banner Sign Company for the use of combustible material for permanent sign at Farmington Oaks Apartments.

Council issued a proclamation designating the week of October 15-21, 1989, as **NATIONAL BUSINESS WOMEN'S WEEK**.

Council approved participation in the St. Adult and Handicapped Special Transportation Program in an amount not to exceed \$750.00.

Council authorized the expenditure of \$600.00 from Public Safety reserve funds seized from illegal drug activities to support the Farmington Families in Action "Say Yes to Life - Say No to Drugs" Program.

The City Manager advised Council of increases in rubbish disposal costs effective October 1, 1989.

Council approved the Civic Center Sign designed by Trikes Sign Company in the amount of \$1,000.00, and granted the necessary variance for the use of combustible material.

Council established a subcommittee of Councilpersons Richardson, Hartsock and the City Manager to work with a graphic arts company relative to developing a City Logo.

There were no public comments.

Councilwoman Richardson asked Director Billing about the recent road work on Grand River by the State Highway Department. He advised that this was an experimental repair project, attempting to repair cracks and joints in the pavement by applying cold tar impacted with stone.

Monthly bills were approved for payment.

Meeting adjourned at 9:09 p.m.

# Warriors set trap for Farmington

The Walled Lake Western boys cross country team wasn't the only problem Farmington had to deal with Monday.

The Falcons also had to contend with a steep and undulating course at Gilbert Willis Park, and Farmington came up short 24-35.

"We have a real hilly course," Western coach Donald Keeney said. "I think it played with Farmington a bit."

"We hoped their runners would come out hard and then finally hit the hilly part of the course and be all winded out. That's exactly what happened."

Despite the course's unpredictable terrain, Farmington's Ben Goba ran an exceptional race and posted a first-place time of 17:09.

Finishing second was Western sophomore Bill Crosby (17:21) followed by teammate Jeff Grosse (17:38). Farmington's Kevin Van Ord ran well enough to capture fourth with a time of 18:21.

Western sophomore Matt Wright seized the fifth spot by running a time of 18:26. Brando Keeney, son of the Western coach, finished sixth with a time of 18:32.
