County officials reject C'ville recall petitions

The Sept. 11 turndown of petitions to recall five Clarenceville Selicol District trustees didn't come as a surprise to organizers of the petition drive.

After a one-bour hearing, and after saying the petition language was vague, the Wayne County Elections Commission unanimously voted to reject petitions submitted by the group, Community to Dissolve Clarenceville. group, Com Clarenceville.

"It's exactly what we had expected," said Susan Gonzales, representative for the Community to Dissolve

Clarencevill. "The beard's attorneys have been uncoperative in providing us with information to make the recall petitions accurate." In order to get information we needed, we filed a bogus petition, knowing it would fail. We can keep refilling it until we get it right."

THE GROUP, Gonzales said, will continue to change the language on the petitions and refile them until it gets a petition that is acceptable to the county election commissioner. Ultimately, the group bopes to recall five of the seven school trustees and eject a school board that would be willing, despite the views of indi-

vidual trustees, to put the dissolution issue on the ballot.

"That's all we want, let the community decide," Gonzales said.
"We'd abide by whatever the vote is. If the school board is so sure the community doesn't want this, let's put it to a vote."

The petitions were rejected be-cause the language was vague, said Wayne County Clerk James Killeen, who served as chairman of the three-member elections commission last Monday.

"The language was not clear enough," Killeen said.

KILLEEN ALSO said the commissioners criticized the school board's attorneys for not giving the growth attorneys for not giving the growth could be commissioners and the could be commissioned by the could be cou

(A representative for the group opposed to dissolution of the district said Friday that the trustees must pay for their own attorney to represent them in the recall effort. The school board attorney cannot represent beard members in the recall.)

A great deal of hostility appears exist between the board and the prodissolution group, Killeen said.

"There's so much hostility, abody trusts anybody else," Killeen said.

AMONG REASONS for seeking dissolution of the district, the group

cites a miliage rate that is highest-than in neighboring districts.

Costick: Hills drain work to begin next spring

Residents of the Westbrooke Manor and Kendallwood subdivisions were reasured that Farmings ton Hills' storm drainage problems are still under review and that up to also mills with the managements will likely begin next spring.

"There's no question we have to do it and we have to find a way to part of it," city councilman Aldo Vagnozzi said. "I'm ready to act on it."

The flood relief program is scheduled to come before the city council Tuesday, Oct. 10, when improvements and financing will be considered. City Manager William Costlek sald the project could begin as early as spring 1990, with the total project bid out by next fall.

Financing of up to \$15 million would likely be paid through a debt retirement bond issue that would re-quire a property tax levy of 0.5 to 0.75 mill over at least 20 years to

pay off, Costick said.

Representing the 900 residents in the 13 Mile-Farmington Road area assayees, was resident Grace Kemsley. She asked for the timetable and requested action before the November city council election.

Residents in both the Westbrooke Manor and Kendallwood neighborhoods were hard-bit by area flooding in the June 21 downpour, due to inadequate sever and storm water drainage. They came before the city council the following week to complain about flooding in houses and on their streets.

THE RESIDENTS have formed a Westbrooke-Kendallwood Flood Committee, whose members have worked with clottal information about existing problems and possible solutions.

"For too many years, the problem has been overlooked or passed on for someone else to handle," Kemaley told the city council Sept. 11 fin a prepared statement from the flood committee.

"Please consider the problem well and take positive action before November."

THE CITY administration will ask the city council Oct. 10 to approve a resolution asking the Oakland County Drain Commission to prepare petitions involving a proposed drainage district, Costick said. That could include parts of Farmington Hills, West Bloomfield and Commerce Township, he said.

The remainder of this year would be spent on project engineering.

Costick asked the council to be prepared in October to move ahead with the project. "In our evaluation of the total pro-

gram, we would not ask the drain commissioner to prepare petitions ...unless we're prepared to moye, of forward on the costs," he said.


