Gardeners plan a flower show

"All Around Michigan" is the title of Farmington Garden Club's flower show Friday and Saturday, Sept. 22 and 23, in The Community Center, 24705 Farmington Road. Show time

is 1-5 p.m. Friday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, Admission is free. Approximately 50 flower arrange-ments will be exhibited in the floral design division of the show, depict-

ing various areas of the state. One class of arrangements, featuring the Great Lakes, will consist of under-water designs, a new concept in flower handling.

The smallest city in Michigan, omer, will be honored by five miniature flower arrangements, using they lowers in the smallest of containers, occupying less than five inches in any direction.

Michigan's center for magicians and magicians' supplies is Colon. It will be represented by floral designs that create optical litission, a filoral art rarely attempted.




