

Cauzillo's putting key to O&E success

"Gary Cauzillo waved his putter around like it was a magic wand. 'This is the one right here,' he claimed. 'It always is.'"

Cauzillo's putting off his marginal play elsewhere on the rain-drenched Whispering Willows Golf Course, allowing him to claim top honors in the Observer & Eccentric/Whispering Willows Tournament Sunday.

"His six-over par 148 was just enough to edge Craig Henriksen of Farmington, who had a 72 Saturday and a 75 Sunday for a 147 total. David Koch of Canton was another stroke back at 149 and Mike Kerr of Livonia was next at 149.

Cauzillo's putting helped him shoot a pair of 78s, a solid score considering the conditions. Rain forced cancellation of Saturday's afternoon session, which meant half the field was forced to play all 36 holes Sunday.

The best single-round came from Koch, who played all 36 on Sunday and recorded the only sub-par round of the tournament — a 68. Unfortunately, his first trip around the course resulted in an 80.

AFTER SATURDAY, Henriksen and Leo Martin were the leaders, both having shot 73. Cauzillo knew he was in the hunt and thought he might have a shot at the victory until the 17th hole Sunday.

"I three-putted 17 and bogeyed 18, and I just said, 'Oh, man,'" he said.

But no one could match him. And it's doubtful anyone could match Cauzillo's putting — 57 for the 36-hole tournament.

"I didn't hit the ball real well, but I chipped and putted real well," the 37-year-old native Detroiters said.

His biggest concern on the course was Kerr, a former O&E champion who was playing with him. The pressure came at the 14th hole, a 370-yard par four. Kerr sank a 46-foot putt to pull to within two strokes of Cauzillo, but his stay was brief. Cauzillo hit a 35-foot putt to regain his three-stroke cushion.

It wasn't the best Cauzillo has played in this tournament. In '86, he shot a 144 but finished a stroke behind Mike Stegless and Doug Cummings. Stegless won in a playoff.

A PUBLIX PLAYER who annually plays the Michigan Amateur and has twice traveled to the National Publix Tournament ('83 and '84), Cauzillo's philosophy on playing golf is simple enough: "Don't think. Just play."



"Too much thinking will kill you. You can't worry about what the other guy is doing. It doesn't do any good. You put a lot of pressure on yourself when you start thinking. Just go out and have fun."

Cauzillo must have had lots of fun Sunday. Top prize was a \$250 gift certificate. Henriksen earned a \$175 certificate and Koch got one worth \$125.

The winner of the first flight prize, a \$200 gift certificate, was Nick Lubalik of Bloomfield Hills, with a 75-80/155 total. Bob Fields of Westland was second (\$150), a stroke behind at 78-78/156.

In second flight, Karl Nagy of Livonia edged Kevin Purlog of Livonia with a 93-89/173 for the first-place prize, a \$100 certificate. Purlog shot 90-83/173 (\$80).

Third flight winner was Jerome McMahon of Livonia with an 87-89/186 (\$90), a stroke better than Alan Jablin of West Bloomfield (90-87/187).

Kiel ran 18:41.41, and North Farmington's Lisa Rives was second at 18:44.67.

Mayor Sever called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Mayor Sever, Mayor Pro-Tem Fox, Arnold, Marks, Soronen, Sowerby and Vaggoni. The following actions were taken by City Council:

COUNCIL APPROVED:

- Vacation of alley south of Rhoswood in Tarabul Roseland Garden Subdivision, V-1-89.
- Vacation of watermain easement - Coppercreek Manor Homes North Development, V-2-89.
- Installation of sidewalk on Farmington Road, Twelve Mile to Thirteen Mile.
- Evergreen and Farmington Square Disposal System Interim/Long Term Contract concerning waste water treatment and pollution control program.
- Public Hearing date of October 16, 1989 for consideration of requested road easement vacation along west line of Quaker Valley Farms Subdivision.
- Special Event License for Arthritis Foundation to hold 5K run on December 3, 1989.

Mercy runners 2nd in tri-meet

The Mercy cross country team ran hard but couldn't put it all together as the Marlins finished second Tuesday in a triangular meet at Dearborn.

The host Pioneers won the meet with 24 points, while Mercy tallied 39 and Ypsilanti 72.

Brigitte Dery finished second overall for Mercy on the 5,000-meter course with a time of 23:00. Carrie Goebel and Lauren Hood finished eighth and ninth, respectively, with times of 25:17 and 25:18.

Nicole Schleuter finished 10th with a time of 25:47, and teammate Jenni Andes crossed the line in 12th place at 25:51.

In non-scoring roles, Kara McDonagh was 13th at 26:04 and Stephanie Aho 14th at 26:39.

On Saturday, the Marlins, who were missing their top three runners, injured 16th out of 21 teams at the Holly Invitational. Dery was out with a foot injury, Wendy Knight mononucleosis and Sandy Taylor illness.

HOOD led the Marlins, finishing 48th with a time of 22:23. The next Mercy runner to cross the finish line was McDonagh, who finished 85th with a time of 24:07.

Goebel sprinted to an 87th-place finish with her time of 24:09, Andes was 96th with a 24:33 mark. Kelly Moore 105th (25:14), Schleuter 112th (25:33) and Aho 124th (26:24).

"It's tough when you know your No. 1 runner is really your No. 4," Mercy coach Gary Servais said. "Everybody was trying real hard to fill in."
