"Lisa ran a comfortable race," North coach Bill Pinnell said. "She looked smooth. I told her to run how she felt with each mile. If it feels good, push it; if you're hurting, pull back." At the end, she wasn't hurting; she was comfortable.

Martin ran 22:20. Kara Higley of the Raiders, 0-3 and 4-3, was ninth (22:59), Marie Scott 10th (23:32) and Lisa Biederman 13th (25:51).

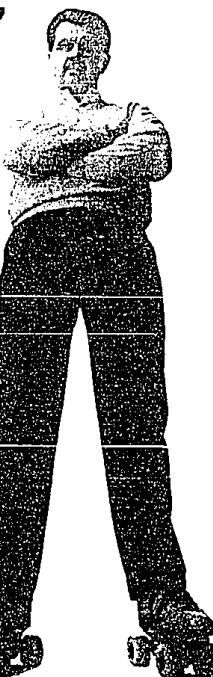
