OCC enrollment soars; Students turned away

Oakland Community College's record enrollment for fall 1989 has a down side.

"We are very pleased that our enrollment has reached this unprecedented level during our Silver Anniversary year," said OCC Chancellor R. Stephen Nicholson, "but the downside of the story is that our records show 3,000 students who were unable on enroll in their class choices.

"We simply cannot offer enough classes in certain subjects because of space constraints."

For the first time in its 25-year

For the first time in its 25-year history OCC passed the 200,000 stu-

dent credit hour mark at the close of fall registration.

Credit hour ere the hasic units for measuring classes at OCC and other educational institutions. Most OCC courses are for three credits — 62 credits being the minimum requirement for most degrees at the two-year community coilege.

The student credit hour total for a particular semester consists of the aggregate number of credits for all the classes in which students have enrolled. OCC offered more than 2,500 separate sections this fail.

Although OCC students had regis-

tered for 201,829 credit hours by the end of registration, canceled classes and withdrawais eroded the total somewhat to 201,138. Also saw an all-time coord candeount of 28,221 credit class sudents at OCCs five campuses. This figure is expected to swell by another 1,500 registrants when non-credit course enrollment is completed later in the semester.

OCC is celebrating the 25th anniversary of its founding in 1989-90. Although established by countywide to in 1984, the cellege did not begin classes until the fall of 1985 after it acquired the first two of its president.

Walled Lake — Volunteers cleared a beach area near the Rouge.


