## Hills to assess drain costs citywide

Li flood control debated, 2A

Many Farmington Hills residents whose homes were flooded during a June 21 down-pour will benefit from Improved storm drainage.

Every property owner in the city will pick up the cost of the improvements, which consulting ongineers Hubbell, Roth and Clark of Bloomfield Hills peg at \$13.2 million.

That amount breaks down to: \$12.2 million for the Kendaliwood and Westbrooke Manor subdivisions in the Minnow Pond District, \$45.8 million for the Franklin Knolls subdivision-San Marino Golf Course in the Pebble Creek District, and \$461,000 for the Heritage Park area in the Upper Hiver Rouge District.

"The method we have use to past is to spread the cost of socie drain improvements at large through the community through the property tax," said William Coatick, city man-

ager.

He expects all areas of the city to benefit, as well as part of the city of Farmington.

### Grand jury returns indictments on 4

The subpoena powers of Oakland County's special grand jury proved to be crucial in three indictments returned last week, according to the man who initiated it, Oakland County's Prosecutor Richard Thompson.

"These (three) cases were at a dead end," Thompson said at a Friday press conference. "But the grand jury's power to compel witnesses to answer questions" led to these arrests.

Thompson made the assessment after announcing that the 17-member grand jury returned indictments against four men believed to be involved in three separate crimes, two murders and a cocalne delivery case.

THEY WERE THE first indict-ments returned since the jury con-vened in early September, the coun-try's first grand jury in 17 years. The defendants were arrested

Thursday or Friday and arraigned before Judge Robert C. Anderson, presiding judge of the Oakland Cir-

There is little criticism of the current city government, or of any political newcomers, as candidates gear up for the Nov. 7 election with attitudes of cooperation.
