## Judge dismisses challenge to Proposition 'A' ads

Oakland Circuit Judge Jessica R. Cooper has agreed with a ruling by the Michigan Court of Appeals and Friday dismissed a request to bar television ads on behalf of Proposi-tion A, a tax issue on the Nov. 7 bal-lot.

Cooper didn't address the com plaint that the television ads con-tained false or misleading language. She ruled the plaintiffs — Taxpay-ers United for the Michigan Consti-

tution, represented by former Oak-land County prosecutor I. Brooks Patterson — had no standing to bring the soit.

Debate on issues like Proposition A should be vigorous and uninhibit-ed, Cooper said, but they should be conducted in another forum besides the courtroom the courtroom.

PATTERSON CONTENDED add for Proposition A were inaccurate because they falsely claim money raised by its passage would provide more money for science, math and

He claims the \$400 million to be raised by raising the state income tax by a half-cent would go into general education funds rather than being specifically allocated for science, math or computers as claimed in the ads.

Tuesday, Patterson seemed to win a partial victory when another Oak-land Circuit Judge, Steven N. An-drews, issued a temporary restrain-ing order prohibiting the airing of the ads in question. Andrews sched-

uled the hearing before Cooper.
But the order was dissolved late
Wednesday by a three-judge panel of
the court of appeals.
The judges gave no reasons for
their decision, but dissolved the restraining order in a one paragraph
order.

"It's nice to be right once in awhile," said Larry D. Owen, the lawyer representing the Promote Michigan Education Committee, the group that paid for the ads. Owen, of the filler, Canfield, Pad-dock and Stone law firm, accused

He called the decision by Cooper and the court of appeals a victory for free speech.
"The Judge said we didn't have any standing." Patterson said, "meaning we were not the ones to raise the issue." The Judge said the summer of the ones to raise the summer of the ones.

There will be no appeal, he said.
"We don't have any money and they
(Promote Michigan Education) have
a \$3 million budget. This is a financial David and Goliath situation."

Patterson solid he is also disap-pointed he didn't get the opportunity to call his witnesses. "We had sena-tors and other people lined up to tes-tify that Proposition A has no lan-guage guaranteeing more money for science, math or computers.

"I just hope people see through the deception," Patterson said.


