her purse gone at about 10 p.m.; It was later found near 13 Mile Road


mas later found near 13 Mile Road with the keys missing.

In Farmington, residents on Lon-gacre Street reported vandalism at about 7:30 p.m. They told police teens were putting explosives into mailboxes.






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
