NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 7, 1989

A special election of the electors of the Farmington Community Library has been called to be held on November 7, 1989. All registered electors residing within the Farmington Community Library District which consists of the Cities of Farmington and Farmington Hills are eligible to vote at the special election. The following propositions will be submitted at the special election:

FARMINGTON COMMUNITY LIBRARY BONDING PROPOSITION
Shall the Farmington Community Library borrow the sum of not to exceed Fourteen Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$14,500,000) and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds in one or more series for all or a portion of that amount for the purpose of erecting, furnishing and equipping a new main library building, purchasing, developing and improving the site for the new building, and making necessary repairs and capital improvements at the branch library in the City of Farmington?

FARMINGTON COMMUNITY LIBRARY OPERATING MILLAGE PROPOSITION
Shall the Farmington Community Library levy taxes against property in the Farmington Community Library District in an amount not to exceed 1.5 mills (\$1.50 on each \$100.00 of state equalized valuation for a period of 20 years in order to provide funds for the purpose of operating the Farmington Community Library?

FOR THE PURPOSE OF VOTING ON THE FOLLOWING TWO PROPOSITIONS TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN:

PROPOSITION A
A PROPOSAL TO INCREASE THE SALES USE TAX FROM 4 CENTS TO 4 1/4 CENTS PER DOLLAR AND CONSTITUTIONALLY DEDICATE FUNDS FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS

The proposed constitutional amendment would:

- 1) Constitutionally dedicate to schools:
 - a. 1/4 cent increase in sales use tax;
 - b. Current statutory revenue sources, including lottery profits and some cigarette liquor taxes;
 - c. Increased share of existing sales use tax (51% to 68%) to substantially replace annual school appropriation.
- 2) Distribute dedicated funds to school districts as provided by law.
- 3) Activate increased statutory penalty to deny 100% of state funds to schools not adopting core curriculum and improvement plans.

Should this proposal be adopted?

PROPOSITION B
A PROPOSAL TO INCREASE THE SALES USE TAX FROM 4 CENTS TO 6 CENTS PER DOLLAR, REDUCE SCHOOL PROPERTY TAXES, SET PERMANENT SCHOOL OPERATING MILLAGES NOT SUBJECT TO VOTER RENEWAL, AND CONSTITUTIONALLY DEDICATE FUNDS FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS

The proposed constitutional amendment would:

- 1) Constitutionally dedicate to schools:
 - a. 2 cent increase in sales use tax;
 - b. Current statutory revenue sources, including lottery profits and some cigarette liquor taxes;
 - c. Increased share of existing sales use tax (51% to 75%) to substantially replace annual school appropriation.
- 2) Reduce property taxes in most school districts. Replace school taxes with permanent statewide millage (8-mills on residential/farm, 14-mills on businesses) plus non-voted local millage not subject to voter rollback. Limit voter-approved increases to 4-mills.
- 3) Set per-pupil funding guarantees subject to change by law requiring 1/2 vote.
- 4) Activate increased statutory penalty to deny all non-guaranteed state funds to schools not adopting core curriculum and improvement plans.

Should this proposal be adopted?

AND ALSO FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING THE FOLLOWING: FOUR CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS TO BE ELECTED FOR REGULAR TERM. ONE CITY COUNCIL MEMBER TO BE ELECTED TO FILL A VACANCY.

AND ALSO TO VOTE ON THE FOLLOWING PROPOSITIONS: FARMINGTON COMMUNITY LIBRARY BONDING PROPOSITION FARMINGTON COMMUNITY LIBRARY OPERATING MILLAGE PROPOSITION

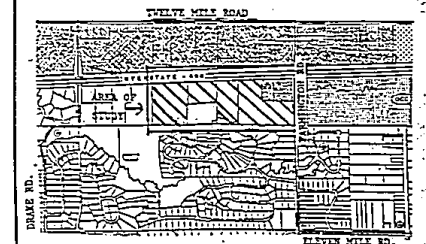

All interested citizens are invited to attend and participate in the hearing.

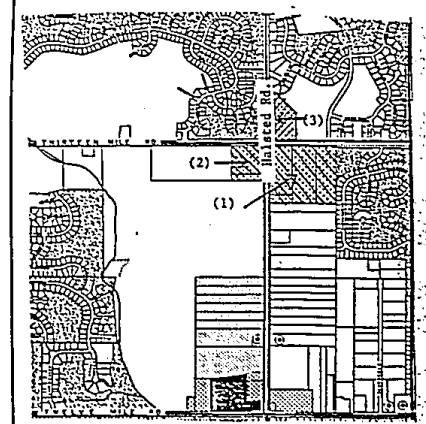

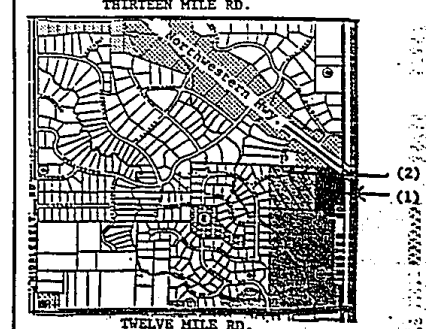
WEST OF FARMINGTON RD./SOUTH OF I-496
