Exciting things are happening concerning our environment and growing things. In September I attended the annual Garden Writers Association of America meeting in the vital city of Milwaukee, Whs. The Indians called it Millioki, a gathering place by the waters — and it is truly a beautiful city.

At these meetings we combine business with pleasure and are privileged to visit areas of public facilities that the casual visitor contisce. For instance, we saw the "behind the scenes" workings of the Mitchell Park Domes, foodly called the Tri-Domes. The Domes, set amongst accres of formal plantings, form a conservatory.

They are joined by a bustling lob-by. Each glass dome is almost half the length of a football field and nearly as tail as a seven story build-ing. They are at 524 S. Layton Bivd. The Tropical Dome contains plants from tropical rain forests; The Arid Dome contains plants na-tive to arid regions of the world, and the third, the Show Dome, features specific floral exhibits five times a year. When we visited, a breatbak-ing Chinese garden was a delight.

UPCOMING special exhibits are: through Nov. 12, A Vlennese cafe with thousands of chrysanthemums on display; and Nov. 23 through Jan. 7, a wonderful display called "T'was

the Night Before Christmas". . . a fantasy well worth the visit. Included will be many, many poinsettlias. The most interesting part was to go below these huge structures and see the boliers and other machinery that keep the proper climatic conditions for each dome.

Another day we visited the Boerner Botanical Gardens (92nd and Hales Corners), toured the All-America selections area, the formal gardens and the rose garden. A 1,000-acre arboretum includes many trees and shrubs for enjoying. These areas are also used for research and education.

located close to Boerner Botanical Gardens and Whitnall Park. We learned that once a year the wild-flower meadows are burned to control unwanted species and to encourage native plants to thrive.

TWO THINGS from the trip stand out in my mild and are so important to our future. The first was a visit to the Blotron at the University of Wisconsin, Madison was certainly an eye-opener. Here we saw potatoes and mushrooms that had been grown in a controlled atmosphere for space agriculture.

The building has 100 environmentally controlled enclosures including 48 rooms of up to 270 square feet in size. We, of course were interested in the plants, but the Blotron is also a research facility for pharmacy, onclogy and cology for private industry as well as university studies. It is a fascinating place that you can visit if prior arrangements are made.

The second, a program called "Don't Bag It." practiced in a Dallas neighborhood and conducted by Texas A&M University with the cooperation of Toro Products, piqued my interest. None




