Below are highlights from agendas of government meetings this week. All meetings, unless otherwise noted, are open to the public.

 - Request to rezone from RA-2, one-family residential, to OS-1, office service — north side of 11 Mile, between Orchard Lake Road and Power. Proponents: Sandra Murphy, Pavilion Design and Building, Owner: Mary Hurd.

- SafeSitter Course** — Babysitters 11 years of age and older can learn safe and sane babysitting techniques from a registered nurse in this fun and interesting course. Class will meet Saturday, Dec. 2, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The fee is \$10.
- Premarital AIDS Education**

Class — Michigan law requires premarital counseling regarding the transmission and prevention of venereal disease and AIDS. This one-hour class consists of a 20-minute lecture on venereal disease, a 20-minute videotape about AIDS and a question and answer period. A Health Certificate for Marriage License, which is valid for 60 days, will be signed by a Crittenton staff physician. Those requesting testing will be referred to their own physician or a Michigan Department of Public Health test site. Class will meet Thursday, Dec. 14, and on various Thursdays throughout 1990, from 5-6 p.m. The fee is \$20 per person or \$50 per couple.
