"We have one who has captured for us in print our community's past and preserved it for our children and their children," Bates said. "That same person plans with equal vigor and energy for our community's future."


Grant nominated Vaguezzi.

As the election's top vote-getter, Vaguezzi carried the confidence of the electorate and "a strong mandate of approva" for his work on the council, Grant Said.




The mayor earns \$2,800 annually and council members \$1,800.



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
