City manager William Costick (left), Mayor Terry Sever and Fire Chief Richard Marinucci broke ground Nov. 22 for a new fire station in southwest Farmington Hills. The \$1-million, 7,000-square-foot station will be on two wooded acres at Nine Mile and Drake. It will replace a smaller fire station on Research Drive in the Farmington Freeway Industrial Park. Its central location for southwest Farmington Hills will improve response times, Marinucci said. "This is a significant move for the city," Sever said. "The city is responding to the need to improve service to residents. We're taking service from an industrial area and making it more central for our residents."

"I haven't always been here. I was offered the job as president. I never though I would sale insurance," he said.


