## Safety questioned after parade's premature start

The premature start of North Farmington High's Homecoming pa-rade Oct. 28, before a police escort arrived, raised safety questions and concerns.

By the time police arrived, between 11:35 a.m. and 11:40 a.m., the parade was in progress, creating what police say was a risky situation.

Sgt. Ray Cranston, Farmington
Hills Police Department traffic section supervisor, said when he arrived
at work the following Monday, he
received word almost simultaneous-

ly from traffic officer Don Fradetic, who routinely works these details with three reserve officers, and from Don Cowan, North Farmington principal, who called to apologize for the mixup.
