## Pantomime 'School For Wives' Opens In Ann Arbor

The Pantomime Circus will be the featured attraction of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra's next Young People's Concerts on Saturday, Jan. 30 at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. in Ford Auditorium. The concerts will be conducted by Paul Freeman.

The first half of the concerts, entitled "Is the March an Art?", will include symphonic marches by such composers as Gershwin, Elgar, Gounod, Tchaikovsky, Ives and Sousa. The second half will feature Lotte Goslar and the Pantomime Circus.

Miss Goslar, who founded the Pantomime Circus in 1954, was born in Dresden, Germany. As a dancer she is almost completely self-taught and the concept of her dance-mime-down entertainments is entirely her own.

The Phoenix Theatre production of "School for Wives" will be presented in a premiere prior to New York in Mendelssohn Theatre.

ANN ARBOR Richard Wilbur, highly regarded American poet, whose new verse translation of Moliere's "School for Wives" will make its debut in Ann Arbor Jan. 26 to Feb. 7 under the auspices of the University of Michigan Professional Theatre Program, has just been awarded the prestigious Bollingen Prize in Poetry.

Prof. Wilbur, who is on the English faculty at Wesleyan University was cited for "distinguished and continuing contributions to American poetry."

The announcement of the \$5,000 award, which is administered by Yale University and presented every two years, was made in New Haven, Conn.

Wilbur's earlier version of "The Misanthrope" made a successful debut under the UM sponsorship in 1968 before its hit New York run. Stephen Porter who staged "The Misanthrope" will also direct Wilbur's version of "School for Wives."

Wilbur has received numerous literary citations, including the Pulitzer Prize, the National Book Award, and the Edna St. Vincent Millay Memorial Award.

He has published six volumes of poetry. He was co-author with Lillian Hellman of the comic opera "Candide" with score by Leonard Bernstein and has edited collections of poetry by Poe and Shakespeare.

The poet, who is 49 years old, received a BA from Amherst and an MA from Harvard. He has been a Guggenheim and Ford Fellow. In 1954 he won the Prix de Rome from the American Academy of Arts and Letters.

The 29 and Up Club is a new organization run by Dennis Katz. Group tickets are available at reduced rates by calling Katz at 399-6578.



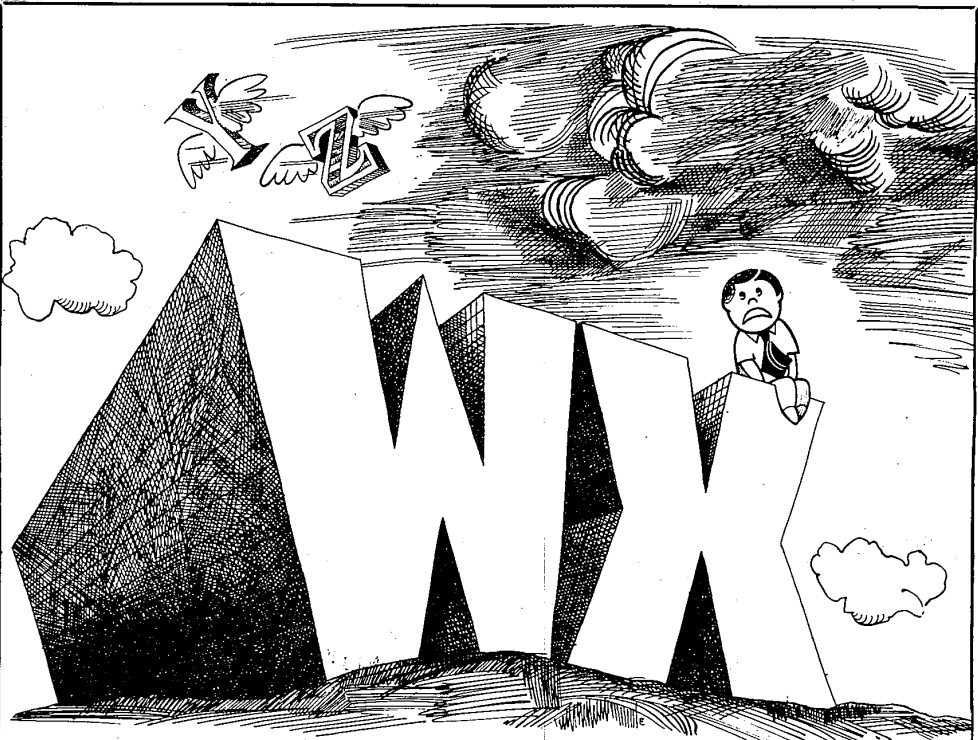
