



Among 31 In Michigan To Get Evans Awards 8 From Area Win Golf Scholarships

Eight Overland high school seniors, who caddied at area golf courses, are among the 31 Michigan youths to receive Chick Evans college scholarships from the Golf Association of Michigan.

Fourteen will attend University of Michigan and 17 will go to Michigan State University.

The announcement of the awards was made by Frank E. Kenney, Jr., of Detroit, chairman of the GAM's caddie-scholarship committee.

The awards bring to 550 the number of scholarships given

by the Association from its offices in Golf, Ill.

THE 31 MICHIGAN winners are among some 230 new grants to be made on a national basis this winter by the 15 regional and state golf associations affiliated with the Evans Scholars program.

There will be more than 100 G.A.M. Evans Scholars enrolled this fall at Michigan and Michigan State. These are two of the 12 major universities at which the Foundation owns chapter houses which are managed and maintained by the Evans Scholars.

Each scholarship is valued at approximately \$3,500. Financial support for the program comes from some 82,000 golfers, including about 12,800 in Michigan who contribute annually to the James D. Standish Jr. Fund.

To qualify a boy must caddie at least two years, must rank in the upper 25 per cent of his class and must require financial aid to attend college. Scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis using these factors.

Groves Minus Love No Match For Blue Jays

Off to the fastest start in history, Southfield High's undefeated Blue Jays raced to their 10th straight victory when they encountered Birmingham Groves minus scoring star Scott Love and recorded an 82-51 victory.

Tabbed as one of the biggest games in the first half of the season with an anticipated scoring duel between Southfield's Brad Allen and Love, the contest was anything but, when Groves' Coach Allen Fordermark had to play without his star.

The giant Love was stricken with the flu over the

weekend and didn't even accompany the squad.

WITHOUT HIM Groves had little chance of handling the high-flying Jays. It was apparent within a matter of minutes that Birmingham was in the same shape as a ship without a rudder...going no place without guidance.

Groves started with a tight zone defense that kept Southfield under control for most of the opening period which ended with the Jays in front, 21-12.

Then Birmingham shifted into a man-to-man defense and that was just exactly what Southfield wanted—there

was no stopping the Jays from that point and Mike Klaiman and Randy Levine, the quick moving forwards broke loose time after time on fast breaks to score.

Although handicapped with Love out of action, Groves never gave up and was fighting just as hard at the finish as at the start but this time the cards were stacked against it and there was no chance of bucking the odds.

With lanky Allen hitting from most any spot close to the hoop, the Jays rolled to a halftime edge of 35-21 and it was all over as far as Groves was concerned.

Allen, who is averaging better than 20 points had a game high total of 24 this time, hitting eight times from the field and converting on eight free throws.

His soft touch enabled him to walk off the court with nine points at the intermission and then he added 15 more in the second half before Coach Don Kaump pulled out his regulars and turned the duties over to the second stringers midway through the final period.

After scoring from the field in the opening seconds of the third frame, Groves hit a cold spell and went three minutes without a point.

MEANWHILE, ALLEN, Rick Moscow, Bob Green and Randy Levine paced a spree for Southfield that boosted the difference to 21 points at 53:32 with two minutes remaining in the quarter. As it was the Jays went into the final eight minutes with a 54-36 edge.

Then Southfield lowered the boom in the early part of the final canto, tallying 14 points in three minutes for a 69-41 margin.

It was simply a question of how big the final score would be from that point.

Allen and Moscow (18) were the big gunners for the unbeaten Jays with Ron Roberts the only one to hit double figures for the losers with 14.

Free Throws Give Sorrows 47-46 Win

Frank Walsh, former Our Lady of Sorrows' (Farmington) football star, has been elected co-captain of Brown University's 1971 varsity football team, it was announced by Head Coach Len Jardine.

Walsh, an All-Ivy League

selection as an offensive guard was chosen co-captain along with linebacker Steve Bennett of Indianapolis, Ind.

Walsh, who captained Our Lady of Sorrows' football team and was an All-League and All-Second Division pick, has all American possibilities, according to Jardine.

"Walsh is easily the finest offensive guard that I've had in my four seasons at Brown and could play anywhere. He's good-sized, 5-foot, 11-inches, 245-pounds, but his strongest points are exceptional mobility and great balance and strength," remarked Jardine.

Besides excelling in foot-

ball, Walsh, a Class C heavy-weight champion schoolboy wrestler, is the best matman in Brown history.

Currently, he has inspired the Bruin wrestlers, coached by Mike Kovala, to a 6-1 record...best start ever by a Brown wrestler in its history. He has a 6-0 record, 18-21 lifetime, which includes four pins.

The 19-year older qualified for the N.C.A.A. championships last season and was a second-team All-Ivy selection. In high school, Walsh compiled a 28-0 record, including 23 pins.
