# Churchill's Neff resigns

On the heels of Pete Seerri's resignation recently at Stevenson High, Livonia lost another successful soccer coach last week when Churchili's John Neff announced his retirement.

Nell, who compiled a nine-year record of 108-25-12, is also retiring from teaching where he has spent the past 28 years, most recently as a business instructor at Wayne Me-morial High.

"There are no regrets, it was a good experience," said Neff. "I loved the kids and it was great. If you don't like kids, you shouldn't be in coaching. I always got along my teams."

Churchill athletle director Larry Joiner said Neff will be missed.

"He was no utstanding person, a top-rate educator," said the Churchill AD. "John saw more than just the soccer player. He kept things in perspective. He was always super organized and highly dependable, We need more like him in high school coaching."

WHEN HE RETIRES from teaching in June, Neff plans to spend more time at his summer home in the Charlevoix area.

"I bave a place up north and I'm going to prioritize my time a little differently," he said. "But I'll defi-nitely be back to watch some games in the fall. I can't help but

long."
Neff's teams won several divi-sion titles. His 1986 team captured the Western Lake Activities Asso-ciation crown outright. His 1989 club shared the title this year with

When Bentley High closed in 1986, Neff inherited a talented group of transfers. Platoning 20 players, the Chargers carned a No. 1 ranking, finishing the year at 16-1-1.

This year's squad was also ranked No. 1 before falling in a shootout to city nemesis Stevenson in the district finals. The Chargers finished 15-1-1.

"This season was one of the ni-cest groups I've ever had," Neff sald, "They were very enjoyable to coach and probably the most tal-ented I've ever had."

IN HIS FIRST season (1981). Neff's team went 13-2-2, reaching the quarterfinals of the state high school invitational tournament.

In 1982, the first year the Michigan High Athletic Association sanctioned a state tournament, Churchill reached the champlonship game before falling to Stevenson.

Ironically, Scerri, whose teams

won four state titles and finished second two other times, also called it quits at the end of this season, bowing to pressures put on him by overzealous parents.

"John never got one phone call from an unhappy family, even where a player was cut," Joiner said.

Neff, who coached his own chil-dren white starting out in the Livo-nia Family Y's 10-and-under leagues, hasn't ruled out the possi-bility of getting back into the sport.

"In a couple of years I'll proba-bly move permanently up north and once I settle in, maybe there's a place where I can coach a team," he said.

NEFF'S SUCCESSOR, mean-while, is anybody's guess. The outgoing coach said he will recommend Marty Caves, the JV coach, for the varsity job.

Caves, a former All-Area standout at Bentley who played collegiately at Central Michigan University, may have the inside track.

Following the cuphoria of winning another title, the afterglow was tinged with melancholy since it meant the end of an era at Harrison. Coleman, who is being sought by all the major colleges, led the Hawks to a 37-2 record the last three years.

THE HAWKS will lose 21 seniors and starters at 17 positions — Gove, Hightower, Saputo, George and Hill having been two-way starters. But such losses are commonplace at Harrison, which means the Hawks should have another outstanding team next year. Hight?

"That remains to be seen," said Herrington, who expects Plymouth Carlon, North Farmington and West-Herrington had said some teams.

"(Assistant) coach (Bob) Sutter and I met (Monday) and went over next year's personnel. We're ready to go right now."

THE TOP prospects are sophomore Andy Fitzpatrick and Junior Andy Smith, both of whom are 6-2 and 170 — good size for high achool quarterbacks. Others are jun-ior Plamen Magdevski and freshman Jeff Cisio.

"It's tough for someone (new) to come in, but it was tough for a tailback to come in after (John) Miller," Herrington said.

"Mill has been so dominant, people don't realize we had the all-state quarterback (Mark Murray) the year before he earne here, and we feel the talent is there to develop another quarterback."

The Hawks also will return juniors Blazo Sarcevich and Gary Devine and sophomores Greg Piscopink and Roy Granger — all of whom started this year.

Devine, who played noseguard, will succeed Conley at taliback and might not play defense Granger will entinue to play swingback and cornerback and will be Devine's back-up.

vine's back-up. In a couple of surprise moves, Sarcevich (6-3, 212) will move from guard to tight end and return to inside linebacker. Piscopink — "a great athlete," according to Herrington — will switch from tight end to wide receiver and monsterback to free safety.

"WITH DEVINE, we think we'll be more of a running team and will need that tight end who can block," Her-ington sald, "Garcevich) is a good basketbair player, so he has good enough hands to help us in the passing game."

Despite the departure of Coleman, who was perfectly suited for the sprintout passing game, there won't be any dramatic changes in the Harrison offense.

"Maybe different plays will be highlighted," Herring-ton said, "With the type of quarterbacks we have com-ing, we might use more dropback and draw passes.

"We might use more misdirection for our fast ba (Devine and Granger), but our offense is basically offense and won't change much."
