Program draws large audience

The Kaleidoscope program, last riday at the St. Hugo of the Hills hurch, featured music for plano and

The repertoire for piano and winds is rather limited. This was a rare example of an event that was imaginative, stimulating and with significant musical content. The mixture of works of standard and non-standard repertoire provided ample variety and range of moods. Take the title for the opening se-tection, for example — Concerto a Tre for Filute, Horn, Piano and lias-soon continuo by Telemann. This

seems quite benign, except that in baroque music one is more likely to encounter basso continuo rather than basson continuo. The latter term is more likely to reflect the sense of bumor of Robert Williams, but the performance liself sounded quite serious.

More familiar works on the program were Mozart's Quintet for Piano and Winds and Schumann's Adaption and Allegro for Horn and Piano. In the latter, Ruske was impressive with his show of flair and technique. If many listeners found Mozart's quintet to be the most attractive item, they are in good company for the same instrumental committee of the control of the same instrumental committee. Among the more obscure selections

tions were pieces by the contemporary composers George Barboteu and Vincent Persichetti. A Parable for Solo Horn by Pertichettie (1915-1987) may be of unique value for Ruske, who undoubtedly finds pieces for unaccompanied born hard to come by, but its treasures may elude those who aren't horn players. However, if one can enjoy four or five works out of six, these are substantially better odds than prospecting

for gold.

Perhaps a work most indicative of this program was the Sextour by Poulene for Piano and Five Winds.

Poulene is one composer capable of alternating between the profound and the ridiculous with ease and continuity. Few are the works that tle a sense of art, fun and amusement together as this one does. It is an aspect of such a program that makes it appear light without being cheap.

Franklin celebrates Holly Day

On Holly Day in Franklin Village this Saturday, residents and visitors will rekindle the spirit of seasons past. The day of special events and activities for the entire family will be highlighted by a Candielight Historic District Home Tour, 4-8 p.m. and a reception for the author and artists of "All About Franklin," 4:30-6p.m. at the Franklin Li-

and a reception for including and artists of a Mooi Franklin." 4:30-6, m. at the Franklin Library.

Home Tour will take visitors through the Historic District to see an array of homes representing the middle 1800s to the late 1900s. Two homes representative of 19th Century architecture are included.

The Slade House, now the law offlices of Falntuck, Shwedel & Wolfram, was built by Dr. Julian A. Buell in 1800. Buell's grandson, Samuel Buell Slade, used the back end of the house as a savoury shop. There, he sold bottles of 25 cent perfume and melasses and other items. He invented and patented the process of dry-roasting peanuts at the Slade House.

Another home built in 1840 belonged to several Franklin Village settlers. William Pratt owned the house when he built the second grist mill at the foot of what is now German Mill Road. The basement of this historic home typilies whal's known as the Michigan basement made of Itelascon.

Tour guests will see a home built in the 1976s by a husband and wife archaeology team, Don and Erma Hunter, Just a stone's throw from he main thoroughfare of Franklin Road, is a Cape Cod home which personifies the storybook phrase "10 Grandmuther's bouse we go."

Representing the 1980s style of country home is a stately brick with a traditional look and a definite taste of country. The Dickens-like holiday decor reflects the owner's (Sandy Barr, owner of the Village Barn) keen sense of the Christmas spirit of seasons past.

It was in this historic village setting that Bettle Waddell Cannon found a story of American history and wrote "All About Franklin: From Ploneer to Preservation." 
