Continued from Page 1 Mile, 15 Mile and Pontiac Trail. Mile, 15 Mile and routine 11 an.

'The proposal follows three years of study by the Michigan Department of Transportation, which has selected this as the preferred plan.

Construction would start in Novi,

with the building of the interchange, and would likely take 4-5 years, ac-cording to MDOT officials. The state received both support and opposition to the plan from resi-dents, some of whom are concerned about wetlands in Novi and Com-

merce through which the connector road would be built.

The interstate Discretionary Fund is made up of money previously ear-marked for state projects, but un-spent. MDOT made the request for federal money late in November.
