Yvonne Brotherton remembered as loving

Carolyn Yvonne Brotherton, known to family and friends as Yvonne, died Dec. 15, a few days after her \$2nd brithday, in University Hospital, Ann Arbor.

She was diagnosed as having throat cancer in November.

She is survived by her husband, Wilbur "Sandy" Brotherton, former Farmington mayor and state representative for the 69th District from 1974 to 1985; two children, Billi and Karen Lyon, both of Farmington 1974 to 1985; two children, Billi and Karen Lyon, both of Farmington Hillis, and seven brothers and sisters. Services were held Wednesday in Reeney-Sundquist Funeral Home, Farmington. The Rev. Kean Cronin celebrated a Mass at Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic Church, Farming-

ton. Burial was in Oakwood Ceme-tery, Farmington.
"She loved her family, her home, interior decorating, and she loved to read," Brotherton said of his wife. "She wasn't a joiner."

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One of the exceptions to this was her work in getting the Bel Aire Civic Association formed when the family moved to Farmington in 1955.
Much more recently, she joined as one of the Eucharistic ministers at Our Lady of Sorrows Church.

Brotherton described his first year of retirement as one of "running around either to dentists or doctors."

Year 2000 printing fee to be shared

Farmington Hills will delay some computer equipment purchases to telp fund the printing of the long-twaited Year 2000 Committee's fi-

help fund the printing of the long-awalited Year 2000 Committee's final report.

Meanwhile, the city's Economic Development Corporation will pay about half of the newly revised printing cost of \$32,000, which is for 10,000 copies of the 80-page report.

That's the gist of city council action Monday night.

On Dec. 12, the EDC decided its economic development paramaters would allow it to share the cost of the report with the city.

The EDC can use the report as a marketing tool to bring businesses, and an expanded tax base, to the city, said city Manager William Costick, an EDC member.

The city will defer some budgeted acquisitions for computer-related

equipment to come up with its share, about \$14,500. Purchase of that equipment instrugent, Costick said. On Dec. 4, the city council, concerned about the original \$45,000 price tag and the lack of a distribution plan, told Costick to prepare a distribution plan for the report and to ask the EDC to up its \$10,000 contribution toward printing. tribution toward printing.

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A 15-member steering committee has overseen 150 volunteers working on six task forces: financial and economic vitality; beautification and environmental preservation, public facilities and services, luman services, telsure and cultural activities; and outlier safety.

Kim Kraft Printers of Livonia, lowest of four bidders, will print the 60-page report, complete with color libustrations. Delivery to the city is expected by Dec. 29.
On Jan. 8, the steering committee will present the report to the city council in a brief ceremony. A study session involving the two groups will be set up later, said David Call, assistant city manager.
The distribution list includes Year 2000 committee members, tell commenders, durie city board and commission members, city employees city residents, homeowner associations, houses of worship, major cor-

porations, Farmington schools, the city of Farmington, Farmington Community Library, Botsford Gen-cral Hospital, the chamber of com-merce, the interagency council, county officials and neighboring towns.

The Year 2000 report will provide a blueprint for the quality of life that residents desire in the 1990s.

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
