# Tenants' eviction bill finds few supporters

State representatives are nice to each other. Even when they blow one member out of the ballpark, they give him a chance to cover up the score.

That happened to Rep. Ted Wallace, D-Detroit, and his bill to prohibit "retallatory evictions" by landlords — a bill supported by a few suburbanites.

As a blaze of red lights (no) and only a few green lights (yes) flashed on the tally board in the House chamber Thursdy, Wallose saw defeat and shouted "Clear the board" — a signal to the speaker to stop the roll call without completing it. So House Bill 4536 still sits on the calendar.

The bill would bar a landlord from evicting a tenant in retaliation for the tenant's joining an association to secure rights or reporting health and safety code violations.
