Gardener finds answer to azalea problem

There always are questions to be asked and research to be done in gardening because there are so few constant, irrefutable facts.

there is just a stream or varia-bles. What is true in U.S. Zone 4 may may not be true in adjacent zones 3 or 5. Each season and each year bring different weather conditions that one must evaluate. Within one's

own back yard are mini-tones, where different soil conditions and different light exposures must be considered.

The serious gardener must look at all the facts, continue to read and ask questions and then decided what is most appropriate in his or her garden. I recently had a problem that had to research.

THESE EXPERT GROWERS fol-THESE EXPERT GROWERS fol-low a program of three feedings a year. They use a product they devel-oped more than 50 years ago called Green Leaf Compound, which is ba-sically an acid soil conditioner. This partially organic fertilizer with a se-

cret formula is spread on the plants on October, April and May.

The fall feeding either is taken up by the roots or remains in the soll to be absorbed in the spring. The Westeroft people were very specific about the timing of this application. The brief period from Oct. 10-31 is when the roots are still active, but tong growth has ceased and there is no reason for concern about initiating further green growth.

The April and May feedings, of course, are to nourish the plants when they are most actively growning. Also, if iron deficiency appears in the spring in the form of yellowing foliage (Chorotes), then Miracid, an iron foliar spray, will green the leaves in a surprisingly short time.

This frequent beefing and soil continued in the plants like mine, don't bloom or appear vigorous. If your soil is excessively sandy or alkaline (neither of which promotes successful rhoddendron growth), then frequent addi-

tions may be necessary.
Several products on the market are labeled as being especially for rhododendrons and other acid-loving plants. I applied one in October to follow the Westcroft recommendation on time of feeding. Next year, I will order Green Leaf in time.

IN SOME AREAS of southeast Oakland County, the soil is quite alkaline and sandy. The closer one likely one is to enjoy the rich acid of the county of the county. The county of Oakland County.

Trying to correct soil condition is an endless task. Patchen recommends removing the soil altogether and replacing it with peat mess and other acid materials if you are determined to grow these shrubs.

Since rhododendron and azaleas are very shallow-rooted, they don't seem to object to being transplanted, especially in the fall, and it isn't a difficult job.

ALTHOUGH THERE are botanical differences between azaleas and rhododendron, to the average gardener the main difference is in their size. Rhododendron, generally have a larger structure, larger leaves and larger flowers. Rhododendron are evergreen, whereas azaleas can be cither evergreen or deciduous.

The larger the leaf is, the more protection is needed. Thus, the smaller-leaved azaleas will thrive in sun, while the larger leathery leaves of rhododendron need shade, as is found in a northern exposure. By and large these plants are carefree, requiring only adequate moisture during dry spells, a rich mulch, such as chopped up acid leaves each fall; and a protected location.



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
