## Business commits funds for child care training

Mervyn's department store, a recall chain redatively new in the area, has made a firm comin the area, has made a firm coming the first programs throughout the state.

According to John Gardner, district manager, the Mervyn challs has established a Community Giving Fund, which allows each store to give five percent of their taxable income back to the community.

The latest grants were awarded primarily to the Michigan 4C (Child Care Coordinating Council) Associa-tion to support the organization's training and recruitment efforts for

family child-care providers.


