Free seminars spell out issues critical to making life decisions

A three-part seminar on legal, financial and emotional Issues Involved in major life decisions will be presented by Life Perspectives, an ad hoe public information group composed of Bernadette Davis, director of Davis Counseling Center, Sue Ellen Eisenberg, an attorney, and Shelta Kasselman, a financial planner.

The seminars will begin at 7:30 pm. Wednesday, Jan. 24, Thursday, March 22, and Tuesday, May 15, in Farmington Hills Branch Library, 12 Mile Road, east of Farmington Road. There is no charge.

Life Perspectives was formed to fill a widespread public need for coherent blocks of critical information resulted in discordant units; legal information from one person, financial information from one person, financial information from one person, financial information from one person financial information from another and emotional counseling from yet a third.

Eisenberg continues, "There's a lot of misinformation regarding alimony, child custody and support. The legal process itself may inhibit a woman's capacity to choose her lawyer and make financial decisions. For instance, no-fault divorce only means a divorce without fault being assigned. It does not mean that fault does not have a bearing on property settlement or child custody, it does. For example, marrial infidelity.

For example, marital infidelity does not effect getting a divorce, but it can have an impact on the proper-ty settlement."

Kasselman thinks of the financial Kasselman thinks of the financial facts of divorce as business decisions. "Financial decision during a divorce effect a woman and children forever. It is crucial that the emotional aspects of the divorce do not impede a women from making appropriate decisions which insure her and her children's economic stability."

As an example, Kasselman said, "the pension funds of a spouse are part of the combined marital assets

proceedings."

DAVIS SAYS, "A woman needs to make objective decisions. Further, she needs to find emotional support, to chose a lawyer carefully, and to design an adviser team which will answer questions clearly and present options candidly. These advisers must be chosen for their ability to act on the client's behalf."

"Women," Davis conditions, "how to continue the caregivers we treditionally been the caregivers we treditionally been the caregivers we can seem to be a selfish act.
