They're gearing up for the once-a-decade count. Census Day is April 1. Census numbers are used to ap-portion political representation in the U.S. House of Representations and to allocate billions of dollars in federal grant programs to local and state governments. Locations need-ing schools, child care centers, and venior citizen programs are identi-fied using the data.
