wide, 88 percent of all fourth graders met or exceeded minimum math requirements — a 1 percent increase from last year. Similar increases were posted by seventh graders — 74 percent, up 1,6 percent — and high school sophomores — 70.5 percent, up 2 percent.

"Scores had been preity flat for the past two years," Benin said.


