# Southfield supports Hills in zoning dispute

The Southfield City Council is throwing its support behind the Farmington Hills City Council's appeal of a recent Oakland County Circuit Court ruling that favored Boys Republic in a zoning dispute.

Southfield cailed on Boys Republic to "strongly consider ceasing operations" in the residential area and calls on the state Department of Social Services to "consider relocating the detention and continement operations" in the state Department of social Services to "consider relocating the detention and continement operations . . . to a location which will not harm the welfare of residential neighborhoods."

"I'm glad they passed the resolution. But
I'm not sure whether it will do any good,"
said Massic Kurzeja, president of the Olde
Town/Mendowbrook Heights Homeowners
Association.

Farmington Hills has been embroiled in a zoning dispute with Boys Republic, which houses boys ages 12-17 in a medium-security

facility on 80 wooded acres northwest of Nine Mile and Inkster, just across Inkster Road from Southfield. In December, Oakland Circuit Judge Jes-sica Cooper granted summary disposition on

in December, Oxisiand Circuit Judge Jes-sica Cooper granted summary disposition on a motion that the Farmington Hills City Council's August stop-work order violated Boys Republic's constitutional rights and did not provide for due process.

"WE DIDN'T get due process in the actions taken by the city," said Boys Republicatiorney Karen Piper of Detroit. "I think Boys Republich has a pretty good chance of prevailing utilimately. Judge Cooper has agreed with us so far."

In response to the summary disposition, Parmington Hills is seeking an appeal of Cooper's ruling and has asked that further circuit court proceedings be put on hold pending the appeal, said John Donohue, special counsel for Farmington Hills.
"We hope to hear from them on the leave to appeal within one month to six weeks,"

Donohue said. "There is nothing to stop them (Boys Republic) from going (again) before Judge Cooper (on other issues)."

In mid-September, Farmington Hills sued Boys Republic, saying security renovations and a new assessment program represent "an expansion of a non-conforming use in violation of the city's zoning ordinance."

In the assessment program, the state Department of Social Services assigns wards of the state to Boys Republic for a four-week evaluation before they ore placed in a long-term treatment program.

The city is seeking a permanent injunction against expansion of the non-conforming use, Donohue said. The private, non-profit, state-subsidized facility is in an RA-1 residential zone. Any change or expanded use of the land must be approved by the board of zoning appeals, according to city charter. Neighbors claim Boys Republic's new assessment program is an expanded use of the land.

THE CITY issued the stop-work order to

give police and staff time to review the new assessment program and renovations made for the program. In mid-August, Boys Republic sued Farmington Hills, seeking roughly \$50,000 in alleged damages incurred from the two-week, stop-work order that cost the social service accept \$3.700 daily.

On Aug. 29, Cooper lifted the stop-work order. She said the city violated its own charter by awilving zonlar board review of the renovations and the new program.
A building permit was issued in error last December because the city was not told then about details of the new program, Donohue and the side of the new program.

put youths who have committed more serious crimes in the facility. But Boys Republic officials maintain the 40 boys in the assessment program have committed the same type of crimes and are not more dangerous than the 22 boys in the existing "open campus" treatment program.

"THE PROFILE of the boys is identicat." Piper said. "No one has been able to demnistrate there's a change in the (type of) boys."

Kurzeja believes there is a change in the type of boys housed in the facility. At one time, the boys there were the same that went to school with neighborhood kids, when the control with neighborhood with reighborhood with reighbor would in hard-core criminals. All at once, we realized these weren't kids that went to school with neighbors wouldn't mind if Boys Regublic were merely improving the facility. "Nobedy would knock them for upgrading, But they aren't upgrading, They are making a change. Now, we've got a prison moved in on us."
