Shipwreck doesn't lower Jane Briggs Hart's sails

Jane Briggs Hart hit rock bottom a couple of weeks ago, but she wants everyone to know that there's still plenty of wind in her sails. Hart, the outspoken widow of Son. Philip A. Hart, has spent over a dec-ade successfully sailing tropical wa-ters on her 28-foot sailboat, Loon Feather.

HART, 68, turned to her lifelong love of sailing soon after her hus-hand died in 1976. She now spends most of her time living on her boat, sailing form New England to Grena-da and all points in between.

Hart was always politically active - sometimes at her late husband's side and, at other times, speaking her own mind. She's piloted airplanes, driven motoreycles, mounted horses and operated ham radios. She was a veteran of the civil rights movement, and, in 1970, she went to tail as a neare activist.

"Fortunately, Phil thought it (my artivism) was wonderful, so that worked out all right," she conceded.

But when she became a widow with her eight children grown, Hart sought a different life.

"I started sailing in the Great Lakes when I was 6 years old," she recalled, "and I'd been sailing intermittently as the children grew. When Phil died, I dain't want to just hang around Washington and get old, so I got a bust of my own, something I never had before.

of these days, you just have to say, 'Let's do it?""

She ordered the boat, named for her favorite book about early Mackinae Island, made in Bristol, Rhode Island. Then she and a friend sailed it way out into the ocean — about 800 miles offshore — and down to

800 miles offshore — and down to the Virgin Islands. "Not many grandmethers do that, that weird woman that I am..." she observed. Sometimes she sails with Bronf-man and other times she makes a twosome with her dog. Tosca, who is half poodle and half Maltese. Tosca, she explained, has been a sailor since the day he was weaned.

A registered Virgin Islands voter, Hart owns a place on St. Thomas but rents it out and uses only one room when she visits.

"It's a place to be when I'm not sailing," she explained. "But mostly I live on the boat except when I come up to the 'continent,' as they say down here, to visit my children."

Visiting her children takes quite some time, Hart added, because there are elight of them, as well as six grandchildren — with another on the way. And, they're spread across the country — four in California, one in Michigan and three on the East Coast.

ALTHOUGH SOME might call Hart a free spirit, she admits she's not as liberated as she thought she was.

She explained that she and Bronfman had planned a 3½ year, around-the-world trip on Bronfman's 38-foot boat in 1985. Then one of Bronfman's children developed a major health

problem. The child's health Improved, but the incident scarred the two erstwhile sailors are two erstwhile sailors of us." Hart recalled. "We were all set to go, life a great boat, and it would have been wonderful, but when that happened we said "Wait a minute! Do we really want to be that far away?"

"We could have been 20 days at sea when something like that happened, and we couldn't have done anything about it. We just decided that our earing interfered with our earling interfered with our earling around the world. We decided right then that we wanted to be able to go to our children and grandchildren whenever they needed us."

"As soon as I get back, I'm going sailing again," she said." I think I'll go down to Grenada, and see how things are going there. You know, we really blew it down there. I think the unemployment rate down there was 17 something when we invaded, now it's about 35 percent.

"Reagan had a big conference of business people who were going to go down there and do this that and the other. But not a single one has followed through. The tourist business is down. The major airlines don't go down there. Nobody has rebuilt the hotels and resorts we destroyed when we invaded.

"I'd be interested in going down there and seeing how it's going." That's why those who know Jane Hart agree it would take more than reef or rock to knock the wind out of those sails.
