Imprisoned drug informer fears for his life

Arthur Sterling Abrams, a drug informer from Farmington Hills now in the state pris-on at Jackson, feels betrayed and fears for his life.

his life. "I was thrown to the wolves (by the Oak-land County prosecutor). I'm a political pris-oner and II anyone here knew who I was, I'd be dead," Abrams sold in a brief collect phone call Tuesday from the prison recep-tion center in Jackson, where he will spend

between two and four weeks before being transferred to a permanent cell. Abrams' court-appointed attorney, Mi-chael Friedman of Birmingham, agrees. "If they (the other prisoners) find out my client is an informant, of course be'll be in jeop-ardy," Friedman said.

Former defense attorney Lawrence Kaluzny of Farmington Hills had asked Oak-land County Circuit Court Judge Steven An-drews to place Abrams in protective custo-dy. But the duty officer in the prison's recep-
