Coin con artist cashes in at Hills cleaners

A popular con job involving bogus coin rolls has esurfaced in Farmington Hills and other area

resurfaced in Farmington Hills and other area citites.

The swindle involves a con man approaching merchants, saying he's from a nelghoring business and exchanging rolls of "dimes" for paper money, Merchants later find the rolls filled with pennies, with dimes on each end.

Similar incidents have been reported over the last three weeks in Dearborn Heights and Livonia. "They definitely appear to be related," said §8t. Charles Nebus of the Farmington Hills Police. "In each case, the exact same description of the con man and method of operation was reported." One-Hour Martinizing, 27893 Orchard Lake Road, was bit Saturday afternoon. Sixteen rolls of

dimes actually containing \$9.02 were exchanged for \$80 in cash, leaving a resulting theft of \$71.92.

ACCORDING TO a Farmington Hills police re-

port:
At 4:50 p.m. Saturday, a man thought to be in
his 20s put 16 rolls of what appeared to be dimes
on the counter and asked for cash.
He said he worked nearby and his boss asked
him to request the exchange. Two employees
checked a few rolls, saw dimes on each end and
the exchange was made. The man left in a fourdoor Chevrolet compact, about 1987 vintage.

One of the employees then opened the rolls and found all had dimes on the end and pennies in between.

NEBUS ADVISED Farmington Hills merchants to "think twice before accepting any coin rolls from strangers."

If you'd like to extend the courtesy of making the exchange, he said, "request identification. In addition, if the person says he's from a neighbor-ing business, make a phone call and confirm that."

The last major investigation isto larcenies-by-trick in Farmington Hills was two years ago, Nebus said.



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
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
