

# Yearbook loaded with facts

**A**BOUT THIS TIME every year, the American Bowling Congress sends out its ABC yearbook and media guides. These publications update ABC records, individual statistics and odds.

The release parallels with the start of the ABC National Championships, which began last month in Reno, Nev. If you cannot find some of your local bowling heroes, they are probably at the ABC Nationals.

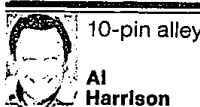
This book is an encyclopedia of bowling facts and personalities, both professional and amateur. The fun part of the book is the section on oddities. Here are a few examples: The oldest performer in the ABC National was Joe Detloff of Chicago. He participated in the 1965 event.

The youngest ABC champion was Ronnie Knapp of New London, Ohio. He participated in the 1983 booster team at age 18.

George Geister's team won the title in 1917 and Geister came back 21 years later to help another team win the title.

Last year, Bob Powell of Wichita, Kan., rolled a 289 game. He was the next about it too much, because he followed with a 129 effort in the next game. That was a record decrease.

championships and four all-event crowns.

In 1936, Mollie's Alo team of Syracuse, N.Y., had all five members of the team first 192 games.

League season records are also listed in the publication. Leagues of a far greater range of oddities. The highest game ever rolled with a strike, spare, split or foul was 90, Mike Daugherty of Wooster, Ohio, accomplished this.

Six bowlers have rolled 300 games with each hand. Neal Bayes of St. Louis, Mo., did it with his right hand in 1963 and his left in 1970.

Weber rolled a 300 game in his first sanctioned effort at age 15.

The oldest active bowler is 101-year-old John Venturillo of Sunrise, Fla. He has appeared on the Tonight Show with Johnny Carson. There have been older bowlers than Venturillo but not in sanctioned leagues.

The largest bowling center in the United States is Showboat Lanes in Las Vegas, Nev. It has 106 lanes. Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park is the second largest with 94 lanes.

George Stiller of Detroit carried a 157 average into a game and rolled a nine. It is the most pins below average. Maybe he was ill.

So far in the ABC National Tournament, Bel Vista Draperies No. 1 from Seattle, Wash., leads the regular team standings with a total pinfall of 3134.

Bob Hochrein of Dubuque, Iowa, is the singles leader with 791. He leads the doubles with 2148. The doubles leaders are Bob Griffith and Vince Mazzanti of Indianapolis with a 1347 total.

The tournament ends June 5 and, hopefully, some of our area bowlers will make their mark.

### HONORED OFFICIALS

### GREENS FEES

It'll cost \$13.50 for residents and \$16 for nonresidents to play 18 holes of golf on the weekend this year at the Farmington Hills-owned San Marino Golf Course, Halsted Road at I-686.

The city council, acting on a recommendation from the parks and recreation commission and the department of special services, approved a new daily greens fee structure Monday night.

The weekday cost will be \$12.50 for residents and \$15 for non-residents.

The cost for 9 holes will be:  
• Weekends — \$7.75 for residents and \$10 for non-residents.  
• Weekdays — \$7.25 for residents and \$9.50 for non-residents.

Discounts are offered for senior and junior players:  
• 18 holes — \$7 for residents and \$8.25 for non-residents.  
• 9 holes — \$4.25 for residents and \$5.75 for non-residents.

"San Marino will still provide comparable and competitive rates to surrounding (governmentally owned) golf courses," city manager William Costick said.

Non-resident rates have increased faster at San Marino than at other governmentally owned golf courses. But that has let more Farmington Hills residents play at San Marino over the past two years, he added.

### HEATON HONORED

Terry Heaton, who coordinates the St. Mary Hospital Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation Department in Livonia, was recently inducted into

the Marietta (Ohio) College Athletic Hall of Fame.

During his four-year career (1960-64), Heaton earned four football letters, co-captained two seasons, and was named both outstanding freshman and senior athlete. As a quarterback, Heaton set a school record by completing 13 touchdown passes (1963). He also received several Ohio Conference post-season honors.

Heaton has been a physical therapist in the Plymouth-Northville area for the past 20 years. He began his career working with the Detroit Lions and continued his involvement in football coaching in the Plymouth Lions and Northville Colts organizations, along with University of Detroit-Jesuit High.
