## **Oakland Medical Care** Facility gets a reprieve

Staff and relatives of patients at the Oakland County Medical Care Facility celebrated — and breathed a sigh of relief — last weck after learning the 120-bed facility would not be cloced because of irregularities turned up by a federal inspection. "I don't know what I would have done," said Iona Mahaffy whose husband is a patient, was one of don-ens of people at the medical facility who celebrated last Wednesdy after inspectors from the flexih. Care Finance Administration (part of the U.S. Department of leasth and luman Services) concluded the facility was no longer out of compliance with federal regula-tion.

That ruling reversed findings from an earlier inspec-That ruling reversed fluidings from an earlier inspec-tion that uncovered "severe" conditions at the facility and recommended the facility no longer be eligible for Medicare and Medical appayments. Certification was scheduled to be withdrawn Feb. 34. But a second Inspection — conducted Feb. 21, 22 and 23 — determined that problems were not critical

enough to warrant decertification. "inspectors sold there were problems," said James Eddy, administrator. "But they were minor and we could remain eligible while they are corrected. We would probably have eventually had to close without that ruing." Eddy and other officials argued the violations per-tained to bookkeeping rather than patient care. They appealed the original ruing.
