Mazie Pilut, senior, Bishop Borgess: The Spartans centered their game plan around Pilut, who was asked to set the ball in the 6-2 offense and also do a little share in the hitting.

Pilut, who has committed to play for Madonna College where she will be reunited with former Borgess coach Jerry Abraham, had a kill percentage of nearly .450.

"When we needed a point or about, we put the ball in her hands and let her see what she could work out," coach Cynthia Jones said. "We tried to focus things around her and let her skills come into the competition."

Sara Brorby, senior, Walld Lake Central: Brorby was a three-year choice for all-league honors in the WLLA and was twice named to the Rochester Kiwanis all-tournament team.

She had 447 kills and a kill percentage of .268 last season, and her spiking percentage was .750 with 714 good spikes and 915 total attacks. Brorby also had 396 blocks and 83 aces. Her serving percentage was .920.

"She was the strongest middle blocker we've ever had in terms of hitting and blocking," coach Mike Lindstrom said. "The physical force she had was incredible."

"She understood her position better than most kids. She's a real student of the game. Her playing AAU volleyball in the spring and going to camps had a lot to do with that."

Tim DeBeliso, coach of the year, Mercy: In his fourth year at Mercy, DeBeliso took the Marlin's to their most successful season.

Mercy was 55-5, achieved the No. 2 ranking in Class A and won the Catholic League title after being runner-up to Loywood last two years. The Marlin's also defeated their arch rivals in four of five matches, also winning the Central Division crown.

"It was a fantastic year for us," DeBeliso said. "It was the best year in Mercy history. We had the most wins, fewest losses and most tournament wins. We were league, district and regional champs, and we made our first Final Four appearance."

The Michigan High School All-Stater hockey game is on the brink of extinction, but the game went on as scheduled March 18 at Oak Park Community Arena.

The National side beat the American team, 6-4, in the seventh annual game, which pits the state's top senior hockey players against one another.

The Observer & Eccentric press was well-represented.

Livonia Stevenson's Matt Cichy scored a goal for the National team. Livonia Franklin's Matt Sharkey had an assist for the winning side.

Joe Cyrek of Redford Catholic Central had an assist for the American team while Livonia Churchill's Jason Devlin started in goal for the squad. Stevenson's B.J. Eglington also played on the American team.

Birmingham Brother Rice players Tom Ricketts, Bob Bowen and Steve Brown were represented on the National team. Brown assisted on two goals, including the game-winner by East Kentwood's Mike Knuble with 12:31 left in the game.

Because of a lack of sponsorship, the All-State Hockey game nearly didn't take place, according to organizer A.J. Baker.

With some last minute scurrying, the game was able to come off. Players this year had to pay \$100 each for an equipment user fee. Next year the fee will be \$150.

"I'd have to say right now it's a question mark," Baker said.

THE GAME has become an annual showcase for the state's prep hockey talent. A chance for players to strut their stuff in a bid for a scholarship. Scouts with clipboards from colleges and junior teams were in attendance on Sunday.

Also, they watched as Cichy banged in a rebound with 2:41 left in the first period for the National side. The tally was originally credited to Jeff Sobiechowski of Riverview Gabriel Richard but was changed to Cichy during the first intermission.

"It was a great way to cap off the year," said Cichy, who plans to attend Michigan Tech in the fall. "It was neat to meet some new people and be able to play on the same team with them. The game was the fastest I've seen all year."

Cyrek would agree. He played on the blue line and faced constant rushes by the National team.

The Catholic Central defenseman got involved offensively, adding an assist on a goal by Southgate Anderson's Eric Zimmerman in the second period. The goal brought the American team to within one, 4-3.

"IT'S AN emotional thing," Cyrek said. "It was worse during regional because the season ended so early... this was fun."

Added Sharkey, who had an assist on the National's third goal by Saginaw Heritage's Matt Salinger in the second period: "It felt good to play out there and play one last game."

Devlin started for the American team in goal, yielding three goals while stopping 12 shots.

Jackson Lumen Christ's Darrin Hand scored two goals for the National team and East Kentwood's Mike Knuble added two more for the winning side. Dave Rammie of Ironwood was selected as the game's No. 1 star, assisting on three National goals. Flint Power's Jake Guzak was picked as the No. 2 star, setting up two American goals. Knuble was the third star.
