Farmington police warn of phony fund-raisers

The following information is provided by the Farmington Department of Public Safety, which incorporates both fire and police protection for residents of the city of Farmington. Residents or business people with questions, concerns or additional information should call the department at 473-7262.

Beware of false claims — The Farmington Department of Public Safety warns residents to beware of calls that solicit money on behalf of the city or police department. One Farmington business reported receiving a call from a man with a company called CPM, of Detroit, who linked himself to a police crime prevention program and asking for a \$37.50 donation. A man later came into the business to pick up the money. When he was questioned by an



employee, he fled the area.
"Beware of this type of scam," said Commander Chuck Lee. "If you receive a call or a visit from anyone saying they 'represent the Farmington Police Department,' he very suspicious and be certain they are not representing us.

"We do not solicit funds from peo-ple in the community, nor do we sup-port those who do."

Although there are legitimate companies, Lee said, he suggested businesses and residents confirm their calims of support to any local police agency before giving money.

• Use 911 — The public safety department encourages residents and businesses to use the department's five energency 911 lines for increase the same property in progress in the city. Due to the enhanced feature in the Oakland County system, anyone dialing from a Farmington phone will sutomatically be linked with the public safety department.

Lee asks that you not call for nonemergency incidents, however. These would include being locked out of a car, or for a minor accident in which there are no injuries.

According to a Farmington Department of Public Safety report, a resident of the house was slitting in the kitchen when she heard two popping sounds before the fire started shortly after 10:30 arm. Although an investigation continues, Fire Marshall Jos Schornack said he believes the fire was electrical in origin.

There was smoke damage throughout the house, and the kitchen was totally ruined, he added. The fire represents the largest dollar loss due to fire in the city so far this year.




