Mercy wins on new field; Falcons roll

Henry Klimes didn't like what he saw, but he wasn't completely surprised by it.

The Farmington Hills Mercy soccer team, which Klimes coaches, hardly looked like the state's sixth-ranked Class A team during Monday's match with Harper Woods Regina. Still, the Marlins did manage to win, posting a 2-0 victory.

"We flat-out didn't play," said Klimes. "We've played much better."

There were all sorts of reasons why Klimes expected the poor showing, but the overwhelming cause was spring break. The Marlins hadn't practiced in nearly two weeks; most of the team spent the break in Florida and didn't return until Sunday.

Also, the match marked the grand opening of Mercy's new field. Indeed, the Marlins hadn't even practiced on it prior to Monday's game. Their previous home matches had been played at Pioneer Park in Farmington Hills on a field measuring 55-by-100 yards. Mercy's field is 65-by-115.

The bigger field and lack of practice had the Marlins looking weary. "We were very lucky to get that outcome," said Klimes. "For the first 60 minutes, Regina was taking it to us, but luck was with us."

The match was scoreless until midway through the second half, when Kathryn Dudley, a senior forward, popped a shot over the Saddlelites' keeper and into the net. Carrie Bowler got the assist; the scoring play started with Kathy McDonald's superb throw-in to the front of the Regina net.

Carrie Dzadosz, a freshman midfielder, got an insurance goal 10 minutes later when she regained control of a thwarted pass and bounced it into the Saddlelite goal. Dudley got the assist.

Zena Garmo got the shutout, making an excellent save early in the second half on a Regina breakaway. The victory left Mercy at 3-0-2 overall, 2-0-1 in the Catholic League.

Farmington Hills Mercy coach Vicky Kowalski takes a veteran golf team can hope the Marlins back to the state tournament this year.

Mercy, which started its season Monday with a 318-320 win over Birmingham Marian at Plum Hollow Golf Course, returns six golfers who played on the varsity a year ago.

The other returnees are seniors Jennifer Basford, Anne Bonczak, Sue Broughton and Renee Lossa and junior Jen Kowalski. Bonczak, Broughton, who shot 62 against Marian, and Lossa will serve as tri-captains.

"THEY'RE PRETTY steady," Kowalski said. "At one point, they were shooting in the mid 50s, and we need them to come down a little to the 40s."

"If we can get four girls out there staying under 100 for 18 holes, we'll do well. That's what the teams seem to be doing that are going to the state finals."

The Marlins also have five others with JV experience and three newcomers, one of whom was a surprise contributor in the Marian meet. Dana DeShaw, one of two freshmen on the team, had the second-best score with 61.

Juniors Jamie Kirk, Kelly Carroll, Julie Krank and Sheila Wisely and sophomore Jeanene Lossa played in JV matches last year and should be swing players this year. Junior Lora Scott is a first-year player, and freshman Kyla Wisne rounds out the roster.

"(Experience) should help us," Kowalski said. "We started a JV program two years ago, and I foresee a couple of them coming to the fore and helping us out. We've got an older, more experienced team than we had last year."

Marlins 5th in county tourney

At least Lahser girls golf coach Bob Keegen knows his players have their priorities in order.

Keegen wanted to take his team out for yogurt to celebrate Lahser's first county girls golf championship in school history. But he said they politely declined because of school work.

"They didn't seem too excited, although I'm sure they were," said Keegen. "I wanted to take them out, but they said they had to go home and study. I certainly enjoyed it, and I know they did too. I'm really happy for them."

Lahser, led by junior standout Katie Shannon, rolled to the county title with a score of 398 in the 10th annual tournament played Tuesday at the Pontiac Country Club. The conditions — sunny skies and hardly a breeze — were excellent.

Rochester was 20 strokes back in second place at 418. Birmingham Seaborn was third with 427, followed by Troy Athens (429) and Farmington Hills Our Lady of Mercy (436).

"I thought we had a chance to win it," said Keegen. "We had everybody back from last year when we finished fifth. It's been a long time coming for us. We've always been near the bottom of the pack, but the last couple of years we've done well."
