

Lahser girls wins school's 1st county title

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SHANNON PACED the Knights attack with a low-midalist score of 81 (40-41). Although it wasn't a course record, Shannon was the only one of some 80 players to break 90. Angie Ford of Rochester was runner-up with a 92 and Drea Wieme of Athens had a solid round of 93. Seashom's highly regarded freshman Patti White was fourth at 95.

Lahser sophomore Leslie Baxter shot 99 and was the only other player to break the century mark. The other Knight scorers were senior Sue Alati (the final medalist) at 107, Kellie Tarpley at 111 and Leigh Morrison at 115.

Keigen had high praise for Shannon, a third-year team member who also medaled last spring. He said Shannon, a member of Indianwood Country Club, practiced over Easter vacation and was determined to do well at the county meet.

"Everything was working well for her today," said Keigen. "She's such a competitor who knuckles down and has very good concentration. She hits a pretty decent long ball and doesn't fluster easily."

Rochester coach John Bailey, the tournament chairman, said Lahser was just too tough to catch on Tuesday.

"Lahser was definitely the better team today," he said. "On another day, who knows? But that's no

excuse because Lahser just played better."

FORD WAS second and Rochester teammate Tamara Ross placed sixth overall at 100.

"Angie was a little disappointed, she felt she could have scored a little better," said Bailey. "But that's not a bad score (418) for us."

"I'm very happy to finish that high, we haven't done that well in a long time," he said. "We felt we had an opportunity to win, but when Katie (Shannon) came through with that 81 we figured we'd have to settle for second place."

Seashom was led by White and Sue Schultz who chipped in at 106. Wieme (45-48) was the only medalist for Athens, the defending county champion. Julie Sperry was the lowest scorer for the Red Hawks with a 108.

"I thought Lahser and Rochester were the favorites going in," said Athens coach Hans Peterson. "It was nice to keep it (the county title) in the league (Metro Suburban Activities Association)."

Sandy Tsai (Kingswood), Kristina Schulkins (Mercy), Dana Kovelgan (West Bloomfield), Karen Kaye (Marion), Christie Dabec (Troy), Pam Pakladiaz (Adams), Laura Morley (Groves) and Renuka Tyagi (Andover) were the low scorers for their respective teams.

Renee Juengel had three hits and one RBI for the winners, and Lisa Ruffe contributed two hits and two RBI.

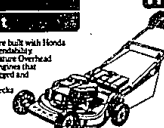
Lisa Gale received the win for the Falcons, entering the game in the fourth inning. Kelly Cotter took the loss for Stevenson.

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NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE C-15-90, an Ordinance to amend the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning, Section 34-3, Definitions: Section 34-113, Principal uses permitted subject to special conditions; Section 34-114, Required conditions; Section 34-132, Principal uses permitted; Section 34-512, Notes to schedule of regulations; Section 34-540, Off-street parking requirements; and to add a new Section 34-113.1, Principal uses permitted subject to special approval, to provide for elderly housing, "dependent" and "independent", as hereinafter provided, at a regular meeting held on April 23, 1990 and ordered publication of the following digest or summary of the Ordinance, in accordance with Section 4.04 of the City Charter. Printed copies of the full text of the Ordinance are available for inspection and distribution to the public at the office of the City Clerk.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS:

Section 1.

The Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning, Article 1, in General, Section 34-3, Definitions, is hereby amended to add two new definitions as follows:

Elderly Housing - Dependent means a multiple-family housing form with central dining facilities provided as a basic daily service in each dwelling unit. Each dwelling unit may or may not contain cooking facilities.

Elderly Housing - Independent means a multiple-family housing form with full facilities for self-sufficiency in each individual dwelling unit and no central dining facility.

Section 2.

The Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning, Article V, RC-1, RC-2 and RC-3 Multiple-Family Residential Districts, Section 34-113, Principal uses permitted subject to special conditions, Paragraph (2) is hereby deleted, and Paragraph (3) is hereby renumbered as Paragraph (2) as follows:

(2) Nursery Schools, day nurseries and day care centers, subject to conditions.

Section 3.

The Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning, Article V, RC-1, RC-2 and RC-3 Multiple-Family Residential Districts, is hereby amended to add a new Section 34-113.1, Principal uses permitted subject to special approval, as follows:

Section 34-113.1. Principal uses permitted subject to special approval.

The Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning, Article V, RC-1, RC-2 and RC-3 Multiple-Family Residential Districts, Section 34-113, Required conditions, is hereby amended, in part, as follows:

Section 34-113. Required conditions.

Uses permitted in Sec. 34-112, 34-113, and 34-113.1, except one and two family dwellings shall be subject to the following conditions:

- (1) - (5) no change.

Section 5.

The Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning, Article VI, RCE Elderly Housing Residential District, Section 34-132, Principal uses permitted, Paragraph (1), is hereby amended as follows:

(1) Filing of Covenant with the City.

Section 6.

The Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning, Article XXII, Schedule of Regulations, Section 34-512, Notes to schedule of regulations, Footnote (b), is hereby amended as follows:

(b) RCE districts, the maximum number of rooms permitted
