from the City of Southfield and the

in Farmington Hills as an agency
to promote integrated housing.

Four men indicted by county grand jury

Coke ring cracked

A 19-year-old man from Southfield was among four people indicted last week by the Oakland County Citizens Grand Jury,
Angelo Boil of the 29200 block of Briarbank was indicted and arraigned last week on a charge of conspiring to deliver more than 50 grans of a mixture containing a controlled substance, namely cocaline. He faces a minimum sentence of five years in prison if convicted, ac-

cording to Oakland County Prosecu-tor Richard Thompson, who talked about the most recent indictments at a press conference Thursday.

Accompanying Thompson were Capt. Glenn Watson of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department and Lt. Dorothy McAllen of the Oakland County Narcotles Enforcement Team.

Three other men, arrested inde-pendently of Bojl, were indicted for conspiring to possess and deliver in excess of 650 grams of cocaine. They

"His testimony (the seller's) jed upplied the narcotic to Rayis who in


face possible life terms in prison, Thompson said. turn sold to undercover officers from NET, he said.

THE PROSECUTOR said Kafanden, Arquette and Webermin are charged in connection with a multi-million dollar occaine operation that entailed frequent trips to Florida to pick up two or three kilos of occaine for subsequent sale in Oakland County.

for subsequent sale in Oakland Coun-Prior to making the Florida trips to pick up cocaine, their operation was supplied with cocaine by the so-cailed "Kalasho" organization in De-troit, Thompson sald. Its alleged leader, Harry Kalasho, was killed last February in Detroit. The recent arrests bring the total number of people indicted by the grand jury to 35, including four for murder and one for perjury.







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
