IN ADDITION to restricting assault-type weapons, respondents supported the following crime and weapon-related proposals:

- Capital punishment: 74 percent support; 22 percent oppose.
- A "no knock" type of search warrant allowing police to enter houses without knocking in drug raids: 60 percent support; 34 percent opposed.
- Wiretapping with court order in drug cases: 85 percent support; 12 percent oppose.

"Crime certainly is an issue. We're getting to be such a violent society," Dolan said. "These responses help me when we get to issues, such as guns. They give me something on which to base my standing."

RESPONSES to abortion questions weren't as clear cut as crime:

- Abortion is a woman's right and should always be legal: 32 percent support.

- Abortion should be illegal except to save the mother's life: 7 percent.

- Abortion should be illegal in all cases: 7 percent.

- Abortion should be legal in all circumstances except in the last three months of pregnancy: 24 percent.

- Abortion should be legal if continuation of the pregnancy would cause physical or psychological problems for the mother; if the mother is economically unable to care for the child; in cases of rape or incest: 15 percent.

pressions of problems in the district and a timeline for the group's final report.

The task force expects to come before the school board twice in August for discussion, then bring a recommendation in early September, said Don Cowan, director of building and student services and chairman of the task force.

Superintendent Michael Flanagan created the task force earlier this year to survey and study all the district's buildings and future needs.

An important consideration, Cowan said, is parity. "As we explore... we are attempting to get a feel for what each of the buildings needs to equalize the curriculum over the years."

"The only question is whether there are sufficient teaching spaces throughout the district. There's no doubt if we maintain the current boundary lines, Power would need some assistance."

Cowan said elementary schools with portable classrooms, or those which will have them this fall, "will probably require some additions."

THE GROUP'S interim report shows the nine areas being studied, which include elementary schools, middle schools, high schools, special education buildings, support services

tions of Bloomfield Township is sending checks of \$1,250 to two Ohio residents who helped capture the

Oakland County rapist, three of whose victims were Farmington Hills residents.

The pair was selected to receive the cash by Oakland County Prosecutor Richard Thompson, who, by agreement of the UHOA, oversaw the rewards.

"What we had was an arrangement with Thompson where he made all the rules about how the money would be administered and how it would be distributed," said C. Thomas Wilson, president of the association.

The recipients were not identified. But Wilson said one was a woman who was sexually assaulted by Steven Szeman Jr. The other recipient, after seeing the woman running naked down the street after the assault, chased the rapist and called police,

who captured Szeman.

"The former West Bloomfield resident was also given a \$8,148 year sentence for an Ohio sexual assault. Thompson could not be reached for comment.

Wilson said the organization's board of directors voted last week to write checks to the two Ohioans.

The reward was begun as a result

of community concern several years ago over the series of rapes. Wilson said the late Hyatt Eby, who was UHOA president at the time, suggested citizen help was the only way to capture the assailant.


The association then offered the money to encourage that help.

Wilson also said the total reward

could go higher because individual homeowner associations can pledge money as well.

"We are administering funds for other homeowner associations," he said.

UHOA is an umbrella group of about 70 Bloomfield Township homeowner associations.
