"He was driving a city vehicle like a Bronco." Walsh said. "We were behind him about three cars. Apparently, he had passed out because he wasn't breathing. He was preity blue when we got there. His truck crossed the median, hit a couple good bounces and then it stopped."

CAMILL WAS alone in the truck. Apparently some nearby construc-tion workers pulled him from the truck. Walsh said Camill was lying on the ground when he arrived.

Walsh said he was driving north-bound on Orchard Lake Road, with Hager as a passenger, as they made sales calls.

A woman appeared to veer away from Camill's approaching truck. She drove into a field and stopped abruptly, Walsh said.

"When I got there, someone said, 'Does anyone know CPR?" Walsh said he cleared Camill's throat, then did the Heimilch maneuver.

"He wasn't breathing because there was no breath, but his heart

was beating," Walsh said. "All it took was clearing his air passage."

NO CAUSE has been determined for Camill's sudden unconsciousness, which also netted him a large gash on his forchead.
"It took about 2-3 minutes and then he started breathing again,"

Camill, a Westland resident, was taken to Botsford General Hospital, Farmington Hills, where he was treated, according to his supervisor, Larry Slade.

#### Red Wing pleads guilty to drunken driving

Detroit Red Wings defenseman Steve Chlasson pleaded gullty Monday in 48th District Court to a drunk driving charge he received after being stopped last summer on Orchard Lake Road.

Chlasson could receive six months to two years in jail, a fine of \$100 to \$500, nine points on his driving record and a license supension.

Sentencing by Judge Gus Cifelli was delayed, however, pending a circuit court appeal in which Chlasson's attorney will content the 32-year-old bockey player was denied a normally routine opportunity to plea bargain because of his celebrity status.

Attorney Mark Kriger said follow-

ing Chiasson's guilty plea Monday that anyone else charged with operating under the influence of intoxicating liquor in circumstances similar to Chiasson's July 30 arrest would have been given the chance to plead guilty to the lesser charge of impaired driving.
