## Dalmation Forfeited For Special 'Cat'

What motivates a man to risk life and limb fighting fires and not get paid for it? "We must be a special breed of cat to do it," that's the answer given by a spokesman for Farmington Township's volunteer fire-fighting forces.

The township's four fire stations are manned by volunteers.

TAKE FIRE STATION 4, headquartered at Buttons Orchard on 12 Mile Rd. in the north end of town. Sixteen volunteers serve at Station 4. They are businessmen, salesmen, engineers, architects, etc., etc.

Their names are: Paul Button, chief; Howard McCracken, assistant chief; Charles Lorton, captain; Leo Lovejoy, lieutenant; Joe Schultz, lieutenant; Hillman Howard, engineer; Donn Achtenberg, Bengt Brogren, Terry McManus, Charles Richardson, Mary Strath, Bob Backoff, Russ Clark, Ken Corns and Roy Strickfaden.

THESE 16 ARE indeed special breeds of cat. They organized in 1959, operating at first with a loquacious fire truck, and using equipment for which they paid themself for which they paid.

Although the township now pays for equipment and has bought the station a new pumper truck (at a cost of \$40,000), the men still maintain the fire station out of their own pockets.

AND THEY are dedicated. Lorton says, "We have the greatest esprit de corps of any outfit in town."

They have to have esprit de corps. There are times when it takes them an entire night to extinguish a fire and the next day is a working day for them, as it is for any other jobholder.

In a month's time, the men have made two resuscitator drives, handled two expressway accidents and put out three fires.

Last winter they fought a fire in Kendallwood in 10-degree weather with winds at gale force.

Also on the books is a multiple-car accident on I-696 in which 16 persons were injured and one killed.

PREPARATION for this kind of emergency comes from lectures given by the state police, civil defense authorities, the Red Cross, the Michigan Heart Association, Detroit Edison and so on.

And what does these businessmen, salesmen, engineers, architects, etc., etc., think when they answer a call from their monitors and report to fight a blazing fire? Says Lorton: "You don't really think of what it is you're going in to or just how bad it is. You simply grab the hoses and go in."

The township is lucky that this breed of cat is there to grab the hoses.
