Aussie wins U.S. Open

THIS WAS THE week that was. It was the Ladies U.S. Open Tournament at Satellite Bowl in Dearborn Heights.

Two hundred and forty of the finest women bowlers in the world started last week for the honors and the big money. The Open offered the largest prize on the tour with \$24,000 for first place and \$12,000 in total prizes.

The starting field was cut to 60 semifinalists by Tuesday, and one of those to survive the cut was Mary Molteni of Livonia. Mary was doing very well to this point when knee problems forced her out of action.

Molteni is one of the truly great bowlers from the area, a member of the Detroit Bowling Hall of Fame and proprietor of the Right Approach pro shop at Right Bowl Lanes in Livonia.

It would have been interesting to see how far she could have gone had not her knee problem occurred.

By Wednesday, the field had been chopped to 24 bowlers through eight-game, match-play competition to decide the final five for the TV finals.

DURING MATCH play, a bonus score of 30 points is awarded for each game won. This is added to the score, which is based on plus pins for each game over 200 (217 would be plus-17 pins) and minus pins for any score under 200.

The five who made the TV finals were Tish Johnson, Dana Miller-Mackie, Leanne Barrette, Alecia Sill and Dede Davidson. Some of the top scores during match play eliminations on Wednesday were Michelle Mullen 277, Lella Wagner 269 and 257, Cheryl Daniels 258, Barrette 257, and Giannulas 259 and 258 and Davidson 257.

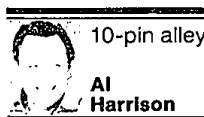
The tournament high game was a 300 during qualifying rounds by Barbara Dart, both Sill and Davidson represented our area in the final. Alecia is originally from Westland and now a resident of Dearborn Heights. Davidson hails from nearby Southgate.

Davidson had to fight off a late challenge by Mullen to retain her spot in the final, beating out the sixth-place finisher by a slim margin of only three pins.

Johnson missed a spare in the first frame, but Dana was open in the first three and was having a problem with the ball. She switched to a different ball half way through the game and made a remarkable comeback, stringing the strikes even though she had three Brooklyn strikes.

Johnson finished first at 189 and Miller-Mackie spared in the 10th frame with this situation: strike wins, nine is a tie and anything less a loss. She gave her shot lots of room to finish, and it carried all 10 for the \$24,000 top cash and U.S. Open green jacket.

Asked about her victory, Dana did not let the bad start discourage her. The quote "Never give up" couldn't have been more appropriate.

Miller-Mackie is now en route back to Australia where she will compete in more tournaments. She has won 18 of 27 bowling events Down Under. The U.S. Open was no fluke. This is one truly great competitor, and I let her know that she is now an honorary citizen of Livonia (in addition to being the U.S. Open champion).

A week ago we traveled to Traverse City to attend the Michigan State Y.A.B.A. scholarship tournament. There were quite a few young bowlers from the Observer and Eccentric area, however, the scores are not yet compiled. We'll just wait a bit to find out how the kids from our area did.

Plymouth's Lori Craig showed up at the U.S. Open bowling with professional status. If the name is unfamiliar to some readers, Lori was better known as Lorraine Anderson. Yet she is one who had all those high games in Ladies Classic League the past couple seasons and the first 300 ever by a female at Country Lanes.

Even though Lori did not make the cut at the Open, she is a great competitor, and I am sure we will hear from her in the pro ranks.

The Y.A.B.A. National Championships will take place in this area later this summer at Thunderbolt Lanes in Astor Park.

Representing Michigan will be Tamika Glenn of Farmington Hills in the girls scratch division and Julie Wright, also of Farmington Hills, who was runner-up to Tamika in the eliminations.

Actually, Julie will be bowling as the girls scratch division bowler from the Caribbean Islands. Paul Summy is the boys scratch division bowler for Michigan. Tamika, Julie and Paul compete in the Sunday Youth Classic.

As more information comes in, the Y.A.B.A. Nationals will be mentioned in future columns.

As an adjunct to the Seagrass Coolers U.S. Open, the Amateur Women bowlers had a separate single-elimination tournament for those who did not make the final cut.

Tina Barber of Westland came through with victories over Viva Ervin, Margaret Smith, Mandy Wilson and Sandra Phillips to meet Melody Philippon for the championship. Melody took the final match by two pins over Tina, 214-212.

Running clinic for novices

Raquet Unlimited at Five Mile and Newburgh in Livonia is sponsoring a series of clinics for runners.

The first clinic is for novice runners or veteran runners who don't often enter races. The clinic will meet on four alternate Wednesdays and culminates with an 8K (4.97-mile) race, the Roadrunner Classic, in Livonia on Saturday, July 28.

The Classic annually is voted among the top 50 races in the state by readers of Michigan Runner magazine and attracts a field of more than 1,200. It starts and finishes at Veteran's Park near the Edgar Ice Arena, with a dance, food and party to follow in the parking lot near the YMCA.

The clinics begin on Wednesday, June 13. Speakers will include Tom Henderson, a frequent contributor to the Observer Newspapers who is a columnist for Michigan Runner, and experts on sports medicine and nutrition from the Total Rehabilitation and Athletic Conditioning Center of Botsford Hospital.

Runners will be furnished a low-mileage schedule designed to get them in shape to run nearly five miles. Each clinic session will include a short run, a guest speaker, refreshments and a raffle of sports merchandise.

Beginning Aug. 1, the store will begin a marathon training class, culminating in the Free Press International Marathon on Oct. 21.

The clinics, which start at 7 p.m., are free. Registration is requested by calling 464-3090.
